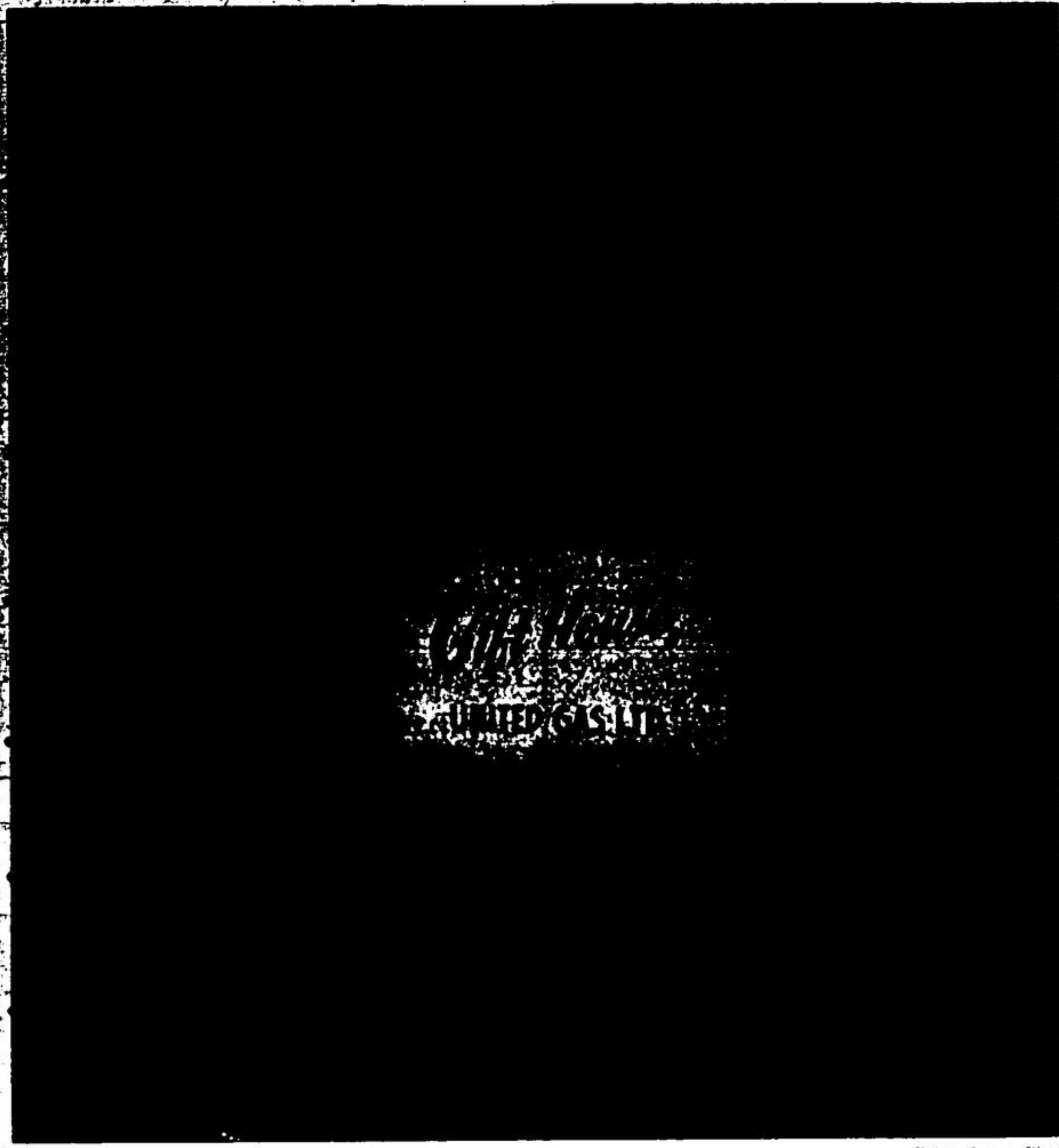
Livestock Judging at Ella, James Farms

"There's been a lot of pub- licity and every delinquent has received a registered letter," pointed out water chairman Vm F. Hunter. "It isn't being hardboiled asking that they arrange to pay."

Letters had been sent to 240 persons, he said, and there had been no response from the 58.

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Ted Scott Made Police Corporal

Elevation to corporal of police constable Ted Scott was approved by council on July 3rd. Cpl. Scott will serve with out extra pay until the end of this year.

It was the second time in two weeks that council's police committee had endorsed the recommendation of Chief Roy Halesy. Last week the move was voted down by a majority who felt the budget would not stand a pay increase and that the police force might wish to add another constable.

Both these points were overcome Tuesday, with a specific clause in the motion that the force would not be augmented this year.

However, Deputy Reeve Hunter and Cr. Jim Emmerson still opposed the move. They said there was no personal animosity, but that last year Chief Halesy had indicated he would test all constables prior to the appointment and while this had been done, they felt council should receive test results before endorsing an appointment.

Action Bank Plans Addition

The committee of adjustment members last week gave the nod to the addition of a proposed 37 ft. extension to the rear of the Bank of Nova Scotia on Mill Street. No objections were raised during the public hearing in the council chambers when only two nearby residents were present.

Workers Stage Wildcat Strike

The 100 employees of Canada Brick, division of Canadian Marietta, in Streetsville, staged a wildcat walkout last week in demand for summer vacations, a 40-hour week and an hourly package increase of 23 cents.

Union and management met last Wednesday morning to iron out differences.

James Perna, representing the United Ceramic and Glass Workers of North America, said the company urged members of the striking local 225 to return to their jobs. He said the company had promised hastened consideration of a contract on condition that work was resumed immediately.

Another meeting between company officials and a union negotiating committee was scheduled Friday.

Outlining the company's attitude toward the strikers Mr. Perna said, "They said there would be no discrimination against anyone if they (the workers) returned to work without delay." Local 225, president Herbert Janke declared "No contract, no work."
