Catch'em Yourself Fish Can Cost \$200

Ontario's Average Fisherman will spend anywhere from \$10. to \$200.00 per pound for the bass he catches this summer; he earns between \$75.00 and \$400.00 per week; he'll travel about 300 miles during his holidays and it will all be worth while.

Even though the early season was featured by unseasonably cool weather, unofficial surveys carried out by members of the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests staff indicate that Mr. Average Fisherman couldn't wait until the weather got warmer; he'd been in some places because the "fishing isn't as good as last year," and in others boasted it had never been better.

While lodges, hotels and motels in resort areas have been and are doing good business, the provincial parks, of which there are now nearly 100 as compared with six a few years ago, have been among the greatest stimulants to the fishing and camping business, they believe. The rush began while snow was still on the ground, when some feminine visitors from the United States pitched their tent of a camp on the east shore of Lake Superior.

Since then, practically every means of transportation has been used to reach the various campsites — including motorcycles equipped with trailers. It's almost impossible, the officials say, to prove how much fish cost per pound. For one thing, most fishermen couldn't care less.

But, as an example: Mr. Fisherman leads his wife and two children into the car and drives 300 miles return. At an average of 25 miles per gallon — if he's lucky — the gas costs \$5.00. Camp sites cost a dollar a day. Food will probably work out at \$20.00 for the family, not counting hot dogs, ice cream cones and other necessities while driving and in camp.

Although he probably has a full tackle box, he'll spend at least \$5.00 a trip for new plugs, bugs, spinners, etc. At the very minimum, there'll be another \$20.00 for bathing suits, sun hats, suntan lotions. Most folks either take their own boats and motors along or will almost certainly rent one or both. That will cost \$20.00 more.

At the very minimum then, he can expect to spend \$100.00 on the trip. He will, chances are, catch more than six bass, the legal limit for one day. But

Set Fall Season For Pheasant Hunt

Pheasant season in Halton this year will run from October 17 to November 3. Hunters may take three pheasants daily, one of which may be a hen. Shotguns are the only weapons allowed while hunting pheasants. Ruffed grouse may be hunted October 6 to December 15. Daily limit is five birds with the aggregate limit set at 15.

Halton's Hungarian partridge season of 1967 will be October 6 to December 15 with daily limit of eight and aggregate possession to total not more than 16. There will be no deer season in Halton again this year.

Rochester moved to third place in the International League standings, with a 15-7 victory over Jacksonville. Bruce Cartwright made a 2-base hit for Rochester in the second inning. Pitchers Wayne Guzak and Alex Ovenden led Richmond to a 10-3 win over Columbus and helped to maintain the top spot. Columbus shortstop R. Quamby came up with a double in the second and a single in the fifth. Runners-up Buffalo beat Toronto 14-4 with Brian Barrett and Bruce Castator sharing pitching duties. Catcher Wayne Farrow hit a triple.

In the American League, Kansas City pitchers David Whiting and Ross Nagorsen contributed 13 strike-outs to help Kansas to a 5-3 win over the New York Yankees. Chicago White Sox battled to a close 2-0 win over Boston. Rod Alcorn pitched well for six innings and a fine running catch by left fielder Bill Miller saved the game for Chicago. Brian Pollock batted 1 for 2 and drove in the winning runs. Boston pitcher Dwayne Hay pitched well over five innings.

The Baltimore Orioles beat Minnesota 8-1. Gerry Guzak pitched a two-hit game and Bill Neil at first base turned in a top performance. Cleveland centre fielder Dave Mathias crossed to get Andy Wemyss across the plate for the winning run in the game with Detroit which was tied until the last inning. Final score was 5-4 for Cleveland.

The Dodgers of the National League came up with their second win, beating the Giants 4-2. Milwaukee catcher Keith Gillet hit a triple in the first inning to score two runs in their game with Cincinnati. However, the Braves were unable to pull up and Cincinnati drew ahead to an 8-5 victory.

Omaha almost took their first win of the season against Hornby but lost by a 4-3 count in a tight battle at Hornby. In yet another contest with Glen Williams in league play Hornby took a 6-2 verdict for the first win of the season over that club. The two clubs share the same ball diamond.

Last Friday night's action finished up the first part of the schedule and the league will then play another half schedule comprised of three and a half weeks of ball prior to the playoffs.
