

# MINOR BASEBALL NEWS

 Jacksonville lost a close game to Buffalo 4-2. Jacksonville's Guy Monahan pitched a good game and Brian Bodie hit a home run. International League leader Richmond bowed to their first loss of the season at the hands of Rochester pitcher Wilson. Rochester took full advantage of the Richmond pitchers who never found their previous form and came up with a convincing 8-1 win. Despite a five-run splash in the fifth inning, Columbus were not a serious threat to say that to Yankees who took the game 15-3. Lack of a competent pitcher for Toronto allowed Toronto a runaway lead which they maintained until their final inning.

The week's American League action produced a crop of low scores which reflects the increasing proficiency of this league. Minnesota edged out Cleveland by one run to take the game 4-3. Carl Yastuski getting across for the winning run. Kansas City and Boston finished with a 4-1 tie. Boston was ahead 4-0 in the fourth but Kansas came up with two doubles and two triples in the fifth to tie up the game. Baltimore slipped from the top spot with a 4-1 loss to Detroit. Both teams turned in top performances. Baltimore's first baseman Bill Hall got home in the first inning off a two-base hit by Greg Higham, but Detroit held them off the scoreboard for the remainder of the game while chalking up one in the third and three more in the fourth. Chicago White Sox pitcher Garry Maddy recorded 14 strike-outs to shut out the ill New York Yankees 4-0.

W. Milwaukee also played a stand-out game behind the plate for the White Sox. Clive Warwick, the Yankee's first baseman, hit a double and a triple and right fielder Dan Denness made an outstanding catch. The National League also produced a tied game, Cincinnati leveling with the L.A. Dodgers 7-7. Milwaukee pitcher Philip Lavelle sparked a good team effort and recorded a 6-0 shut-out over the St. Louis Cardinals. The other game in the league saw the Giants take a narrow 3-2 win over the Pittsburgh Pirates.

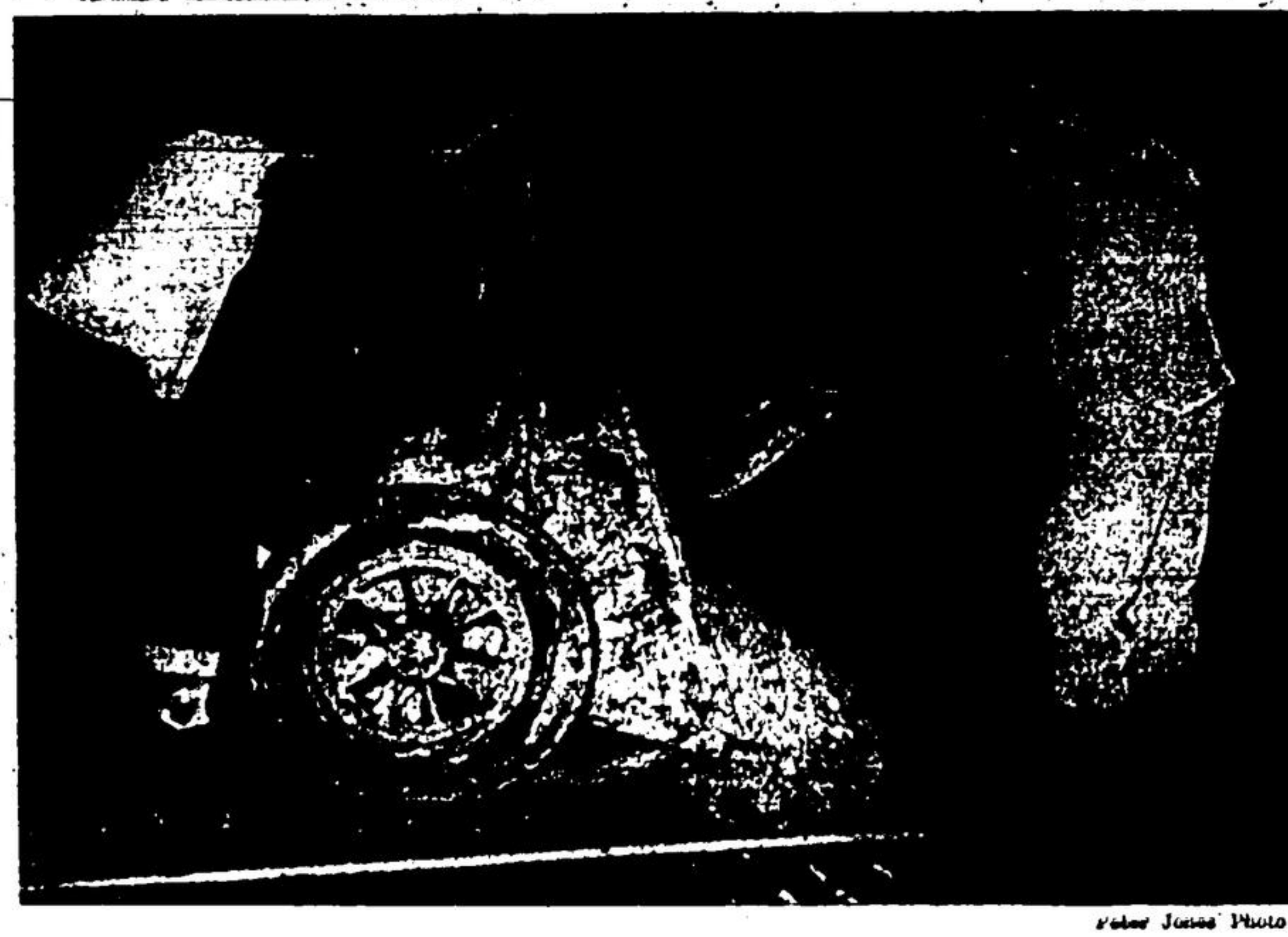
