## Terms Hospital By-law County Backward Step

"A backward step" was the opinion expressed by Halton Hospitals Association Chairman Paul Fisher, at County Council last week, in describing the proposed by-law which would drastically change the County grants to hospitals.

The by-law now in effect obligates County Council to grant \$6,000 per bed to approved hospital construction, whereas the proposed by-law obligates them only to match the total of Federal and Provincial grants.

In the event the Federal and Provincial grants exceed fifty per cent of the cost, County Council will not match the amount, but only make up the difference, according to the new proposal. Any amount in excess of the above would be at the discretion of County Council.

In a spirited defence of the by-law now in effect, Mr. Fisher stated, "Future costs will go up not down, and consequently grants will go up. In this case you might find yourself granting more than \$4000."

### Weed Controller Says Public is Cooperative

Most property owners have been cooperative, reported Milton Barker, who recently was named the post of weed inspector for the town, when he reported Monday to council.

Mr. Barker said he had investigated many complaints of weed infestations and also toured the town on his own to locate areas which need cutting. He asked council's assistance in locating tractors to be used to cut weeds and bill the owner.
