## Terms Hospital By-law County Backward Step

"A backward step" was the opinion expressed by Halton Hospitals Association Chairman Paul Fisher, County Council last week, in describing the proposed by law which would drastically change the County grants to

The by-law now in effect obligates County Council to grant \$6,000 per bed to approved hospital construction whereas the proposed by-law obligates then, only to match the total of Federal and Provincial grants. At present eacgovernment grants \$2000 per bed, or a total of \$4000. These, of course, are subject to change.

In the event the Federal and Provincial grants exceed fifty per cent of the cost, County Council will not match . the amount, but only make up the difference, according to the new proposal. Any amount in excess of the above would be at the discretion of County Council.
