Starting in the newer part of town, when the Delrex subdivision originated in 1954, the nine sitting members of council added their names to town history when a street was named for each-

Jack Armstrong, mayor at that time, was assigned Armstrong Avenue which enters the industrial area from Mountainview Road. Allen Road was named for Reeve Stan Allen, who left town a few years later to become superintendent of Halton. Centennial Manor in Milton. Norton Crescent took its name from Al Norton who was deputy reeve.
