

Government Vehicle Order To Brampton Rambler Plant

American Motors (Canada) Ltd. has been awarded a contract by the Department of Defence Production. The contract is for the supply of motor vehicles.

It is one of 123 unclassified defence contracts for \$10,000 or more awarded by the department during the first half of June. Total value of the contracts is \$3,192,112.

In recent months, similar contracts have been awarded by the department to General Motors at Oshawa and the Ford Motor Company at Oakville.

American Motors officials made no comment on the contract, but it is understood that the vehicles are standard production types and will be used for military non-combat purposes.

K. K. Howbridge, president and general manager, reported that Ramblers retail sales have continued to break all records. June sales posted a 77 per cent gain over the same period last year.

Reported sales reached 2,170 units, compared with 1,227 in 1961. This gain has brought total sales for the 1962 model year to 14,716, an increase of 70 per cent.

Commenting on the recent government tax on imported cars, Mr. Howbridge stated that the company looks forward to an excellent year in 1963 as the new plant in Brampton will be assembling all models of Ramblers.

"This move," said Howbridge, "will not only supply more work for Canadians in automotive plants, but will be reflected in increased employment in the growing number of Canadian suppliers of automotive parts."

"The 1963 Ramblers will be produced in Canada at maximum plant capacity to meet the expected demand."

Accept Offer Of Sales Tax Study

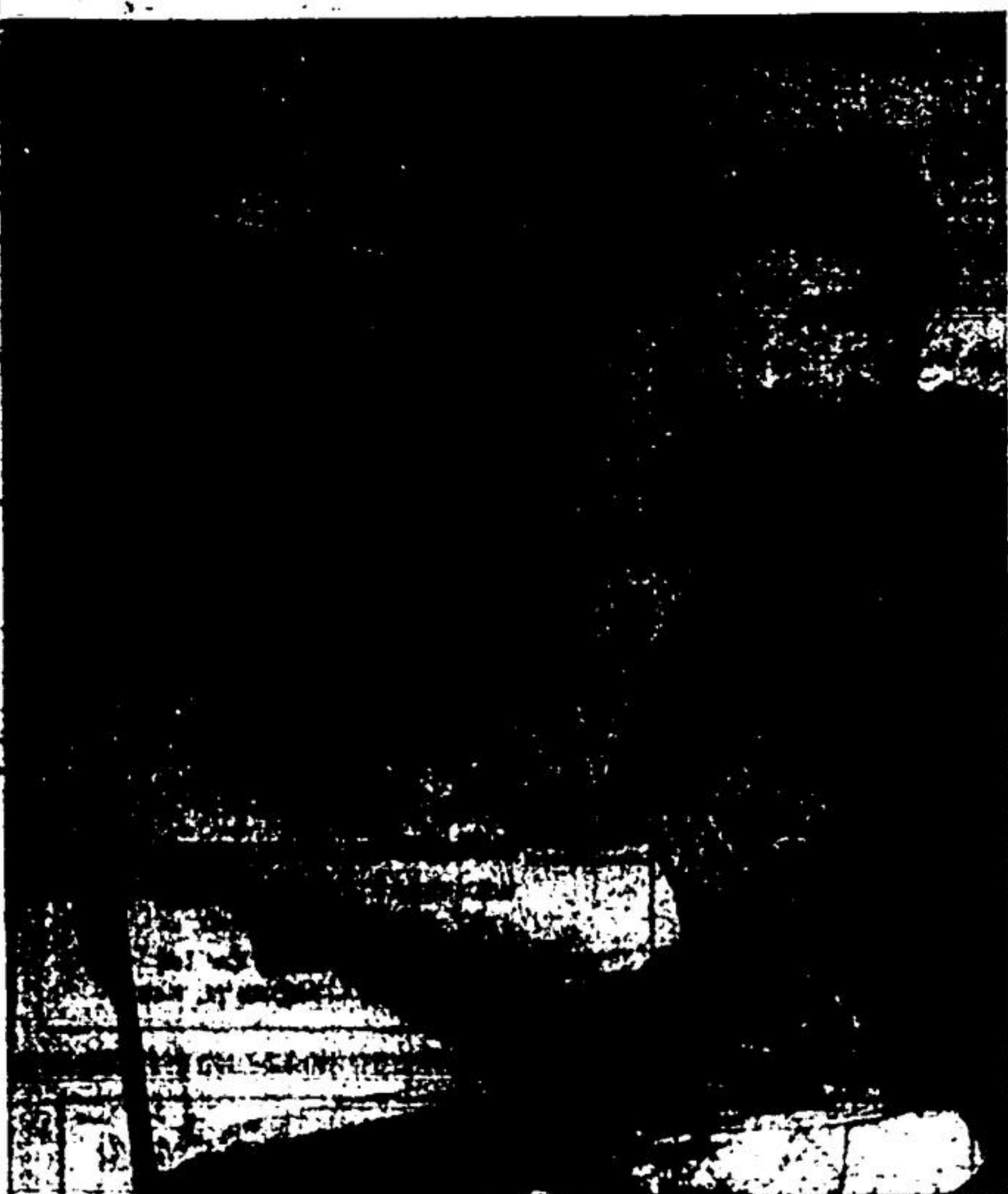
Georgetown can't lose by accepting a proposition from accountant George Mitchell who has offered to check local council purchases and advise where sales tax rebates might be secured.

Rash of Chinguacousy Fires But No "Link" Established

A spectacular Chinguacousy barn and shed blaze July 4th, that threatened to race across a field to a neighboring farm, was the fourth fire to hit the township in two weeks.

The blaze completely gutted the two buildings on the farm of Charles McHaffie, Fourth Line W. above Highway 7. Another fire the next day which destroyed a storage shed on the farm of Harry South on the First Line E. in Toronto Township, raised the area's fire total to five.

The recent rash of fires in Chinguacousy prompted an investigation by the Ontario Fire Marshall's Department. Chinguacousy Police Chief Ken Sider, who assisted in the investigation, said that so far no connection has been found between the fires.

The McHaffie fire started at 2:10 p.m. when Mrs. McHaffie looked out the window to see flames shooting up behind the shed. Mr. McHaffie was away at the time.

Chinguacousy Fire Chief Peter Munk said that apparently the children were not near where the fire started and there was no hydro in the shed. He said the cause was unknown.

Toronto Firm Buys Local Bond Issue

A \$142,000 debenture issue which will pay for the George Kennedy public school addition has been purchased from the town by the Bell Gouinlock investment firm in Toronto.

Through efforts of financier chairman Bob McNelly, the town will save some money by this, instead of having the bonds purchased by a government agency as has been common in the past few years.

The \$142,000 debentures have varying maturities from 1963 to 1982 and will be issued in \$1,000 amounts. The town will net a flat 100 per cent on the sale.
