## FARM NEWS

### Farmers Must Obey Safety on Highways

Many Halton farmers must move farm machinery on the road. Since all roads in Halton have considerable traffic, the danger of accidents is high. Many motorists do not recognize slow moving machinery until it is too late.

Farmers moving machinery on Ontario Roads should get the recent Ontario Department of Transport publication entitled "Farm Implements on Ontario's Highways." This publication describes the Highway Traffic Act as it relates to the movement of farm tractors and machines on the road. It explains the legal status of a tractor travelling alone, or pulling a farm implement. Two hundred of these booklets have been distributed to Halton farm operators.

### SPECIAL PERMIT

It tells how to get a special permit, fee, which allows you to move farm equipment that is larger than normally allowed by the Act. - In the interests of safety it tells why certain restrictions are imposed.

A farm tractor is not a MOTOR vehicle under the Act, but it is a VEHICLE, and any requirements for vehicles apply equally to farm tractors. For instance, did you know that your 15 year old son may drive a tractor ACROSS the road, but it is illegal for him to drive it ALONG the road. Were you also aware that you may lose demerit points from your automobile driver's permit, if you commit certain offences under the Highway Traffic or the Criminal Code of Canada? These regulations are not designed to limit the travel of farm machinery on the highway, but to control such travel for the safety of all.

**INVOLVED IN DEATHS**  
During 1961 farm tractors were involved in 186 highway accidents, resulting in considerable death and injury, and property damage of well over \$200,000. Many of these tractor operators did not realize that they were failing to comply with the rules of the road.
