## Mill Waste Odour Problem is Studied

This Year is Worst Ever, Resident Says

Complaining of odour from mill waste at the Alliance Paper Mills Ltd., King Street resident Harry Hayward was told by council Monday that the mill management and the Ontario Water Resources Commission are being approached in an attempt to find a solution.

Mr. Hayward said the problem has existed for some years and that some time ago a number of King St. residents had unsuccessfully appealed for a lower assessment because of depreciated property values.

"But we don't want our assessment lowered. We'd rather have the odour decreased," he added.

For a couple of years after the assessment appeal the condition had eased, he said, but this year it is the worst it has ever been. Residents can't sit outside on a summer evening and on one occasion the odour was so bad it had wakened him from sleep, he said.

Do Something

"When there were complaints about the garbage dump council visited the site and took action," he said. "I don't expect the odour can be entirely eliminated but council can surely do something for us."

Mayor Sargent said he agrees that the odour is objectionable and that last week council's public works committee decided to approach the OWRC and the mill to seek a solution.

Legitimate Claim

"Mr. Hayward has a legitimate claim. I travel this road every day and I agree with what he says," said Deputy Reeve Wm. F. Hunter.
