**Industrial Display
Planned in September**

Georgetown industry will be put on public display in September.

At a meeting of the Industrial Commission with council last week it was announced that an Industrial Display similar to the one held here some time ago, would be organized for early September. The tentative dates are September 7th, 8th, and 9th, in the arena.

The display will be a joint commission - council project and will be open to the general public on two of the three days, the third day to be reserved for a private tour by representatives of potential new industry.

The three local service clubs, Lions, Rotary and Kiwanis, will assist the sponsors and operate concessions. Industrial Commission chairman Roger Wade, said invitations are being mailed to local firms, to take part and to attend town companies, to be out of town plants, have enquired about entering an exhibit already.

Rates for space in the display vary from \$10 to \$20. Mr. Wade said, Halton's members of Parliament, Mr. Harry Harby would be approached to attend. The Minister of Economics and Development, Hon. Robert Macaulay has been invited as have the business development representatives of all banks.
