A committee to report on the need for overall planning of services, will be appointed by the executive of the Halton Community Welfare Council, it was decided at a meeting of the Council in Milton last week.

It was suggested at the meeting that a social planning council be set up for the purpose of coordinating the overall planning of any new welfare services in the county, and extending present functions.

A brief presented by the Family Service Bureau suggested the setting up of a card registry of families served by local welfare agencies, and a directory of welfare services.

It was pointed out by Bernard Grady, executive director of the Oakville Y.M.C.A., that overall planning would put an end to duplication of effort, and expense.

Hog Cholera In Peel, None Here

Halton County, at writing time, was still free of the dreaded Hog Cholera according to the Department of Agriculture office of Milton. But the disease isn't far away.

It spread into Peel county last week when federal agricultural officials ordered 400 pigs destroyed on the farm of R. G. Head, R.R. 3, Milton. The pigs were purchased in Belleville by Mr. Head and it was shortly after that he began to notice that something was wrong with them although no more than the normal number had died. He asked agricultural officials to examine his pigs and they confirmed that the animals had Hog Cholera.

The only method of control is to slaughter the diseased animals and Mr. Head stated that arrangements for sanitary disposal of the pigs were made as soon as the diagnosis was made. Owners are paid full market prices by the government.

The disease has already been found in six Ontario counties and twelve Quebec counties. The agricultural officials know of diseased animals and were trying to trace them.

Hog Cholera has cost the government \$220,000 to date for 2,744 animals slaughtered in the current outbreak.

Road Department Stays in Village

A portion of Esquesing's municipal business will be conducted at a new location later this year when a projected new building is completed on the 7th line.

Tenders were called this week for construction of a new municipal office.

It will be built on part of the Charles Greig farm, west of the golf course corner, on a 5 acre property purchased recently by the township. A one-story brick and concrete structure will be erected there, approximately 33'x85'.

The building will have a general office, council chamber and offices for clerk K. C. Lindsay and assessor Arthur Bankson.

Contractors have until August 14th to submit bids on the building. Architect is D. G. Halford, Oakville.

Renovated in 1948

Prior to 1925, township council meetings were held across the road in a small building owned by the clerk, Jack Yrsey who served in that office for almost a quarter century. The building stood on the grounds of what is now Mrs. Harry Lawson's home. It was moved some years ago and is now part of the Heaver Lumber property in town.

In 1948 the township hall underwent extensive renovations. The top two stories were lopped off, the downstairs completely modernized and a garage and storage space added at the rear. An appointed board administers the building which, besides its municipal function, is extensively used for banquets and dances for township residents and implement agency in the town.

Struck By Car, Has Critical Injuries

George Scotland, 51, resident of Guelph, is in hospital in critical condition as the result of a hit and run accident at the corner of Guelph and Main St. early Friday evening.

Mr. Scotland and his wife, had just gotten off a bus at the south side of Main and were crossing to the north side of Guelph opposite Kennedy's Klub 7 Restaurant when a westbound car struck him and continued without stopping.

Three witnesses passed the car's plate numbers and a description on to police and within two hours of an extensive search by Georgetown Police and OPP, an R.R. 1, Acton youth was apprehended and charged with careless driving and failing to remain at the scene of an accident.

Arraigned in court Monday, and released on \$1,000 bail was Keith Job, 18, Lot 33, Concession 6, Nassagawan. He will appear in court for trial on August 27th.

Mr. Scotland was given first aid at the scene by Cst. Mike Christopher of the Georgetown police and worked on by two doctors in Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital until 5 a.m.

His injuries were listed as multiple fractures of both hips and legs, internal injuries and brain damage.

Lived In Yorkshire Before Coming Here

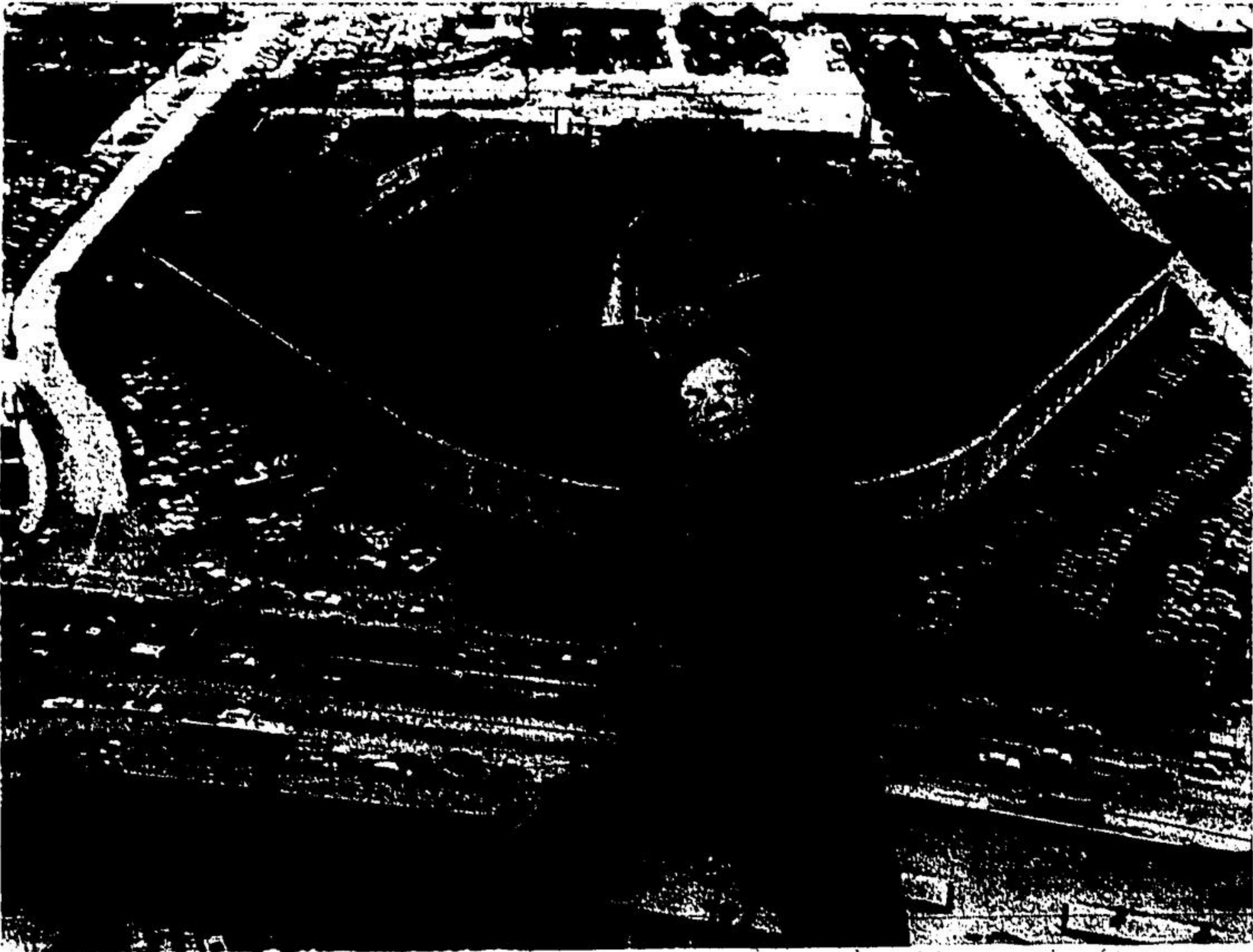
