concrete spillway. This is an increase of some 2 1/2 feet over the 1955 level of siltation. The cost of repairs to the dam in 1955 was estimated at \$40,000. This cost would be increased to approximately \$90,000 at the present date. The cost of repairs to the dam does not include removal of silt in the pond. As indicated above in Section 4, there would be a periodic maintenance cost for silt removal. An approximate cost for silt removal to a depth of 8 feet below the crest of the dam at 50c per cubic yard is \$60,000, plus haulage costs.

An engineering report which listed the following findings influenced the CVCA in their decision to take no action.

- 1 The dam has no flood control value.
- 2 The principal benefactors in this scheme are the cottage owners on the north side of the reservoir, site and the park owners on the south side.
- 3 There are very limited possibilities of the development of public land for recreational purposes, also the water in this section of the river is below health standards for swimming. The reservoir is silted up to approximately the top of the
