LOIS NIVEN, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Niven, 1 Edith St., has been selected by the government to enter a combined training-teaching program at the Ontario School for the Deaf at Belleville. Each year only a few outstanding students are appointed for these positions.

JOAN CRAIG, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Craig, 34 Victoria St., plans to teach at Bulloch's School, located north of Perth.

MITA KLOOSTER, who is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Klooster, R.R. 1, has been employed by the Wellandport Christian School.

George St., will be joining the staff of Harrison School in Georgetown in September.

MRS. DOUG UNSWORTH, 44 Norton Cres., has also joined a Georgetown School. She plans to teach Grade 3 at Chapel Street School.

Bornhold Promotion To Queen's Park

Inspector of Public Schools in this area of Halton County since his appointment in 1963 to assist Mr. L. L. Skuse, Mr. H. V. Bornhold has been appointed as an Assistant Superintendent of Elementary Education with offices in the Parliament Buildings, Toronto.

A native of Kitchener, Mr. Bornhold attended elementary and secondary schools there. He is a graduate of St. Michael's Normal School, the University of Western Ontario where he obtained his Bachelor of Arts degree in 1949, and of the University of Toronto where he gained a Master of Education degree in 1954.

The new inspector of Georgetown schools, Mr. O. G. McDowell, is a native of London where he received his education. He graduated from London Normal School and from the University of Western Ontario with a Bachelor of Arts Degree in 1957 and did post graduate work at College of Education. He has experience as principal and supervising principal of suburban schools in London Township and became a public school inspector in August 1961.

Union Not Pleased With Avro Merger

Toronto's two big aircraft companies—Avro Aircraft Ltd. and de Havilland Aircraft Co.—recently announced plans to join forces, but the move was greeted with mixed feelings in the industry.

Executives who refused to reveal details of the multi-million dollar deal, said the takeover of Avro by de Havilland will be "a good thing for the Canadian aircraft industry."

They said no employees would lose jobs and added that Avro's enormous facilities at Malton would be put to fuller use.

ALARMED

But a union official said the move is part of a plot to cut Avro workers' wages and cut lead to industrial strife.

He said employees were alarmed by the layoff of 51 men at Avro's sister company, Branda Engines, yesterday and by rumours that a further 400 men were to be laid off by July 27th.

The takeover gives de Havilland complete control of Avro Aircraft and its related company, Canadian Applied Research—both owned by Hawker Siddeley Canada Ltd.—and of their 2,000,000 square feet of plant space at Malton.

Orrenda Engines Ltd. is not involved in the deal.

The deal was announced in a joint statement issued by company heads, P. C. Garratt of de Havilland and T. J. Emmert of Hawker Siddeley Canada.

"It is intended to employ all present personnel working at Malton," they said. "No significant variations in conditions of employment are foreseen."

WORK BUILD-UP

"In due course it means a build-up of work at the Malton plant. An initial step will be the transfer from Downsview to Malton of the de Havilland Special Products Division."

Neither executive would elaborate on the statement, but Mr. Emmert said Avro's 1,200 employees and de Havilland's 3,100 have nothing to fear in the takeover.

"Avro is an unsuccessful company but has a lot of production facilities," he said. "De Havilland is a successful company but has limited facilities. It makes sense for the two to join up."

But the International Association of Machinists representative Fred Turner claimed the move is part of a plot to "bust union wages."

"BETTER WAGES"

"Avro employees are members of the IAM and have better wages and better contract provisions than de Havilland employees who are members of the United Auto Workers Union," he said.

"This is a union of two companies of different political faiths who are just playing politics."

"They are out to cut workers' wages and to make capital out of their different political contacts."

Mr. Turner said there have been persistent rumors at Avro recently that 400 men are

to be laid off in the next six weeks although there was ample work to keep a full staff employed.

He said there has been a steady flow of key technicians leaving the company because of policy differences with management.

All the women asked are mothers.

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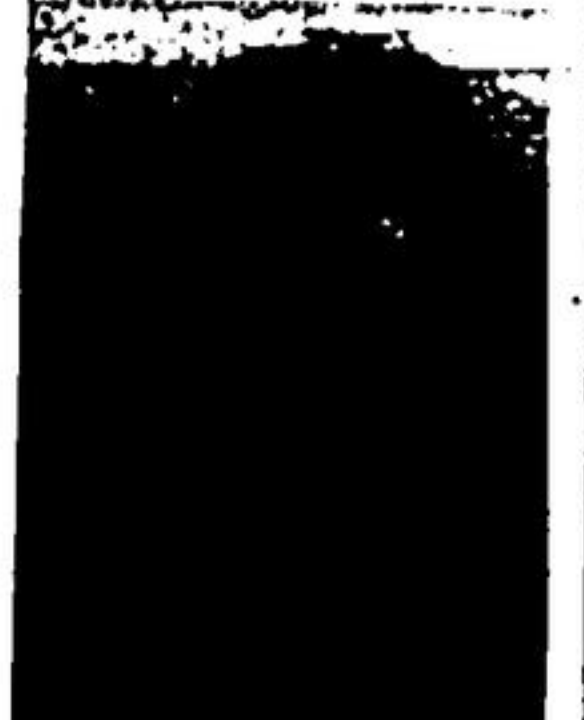
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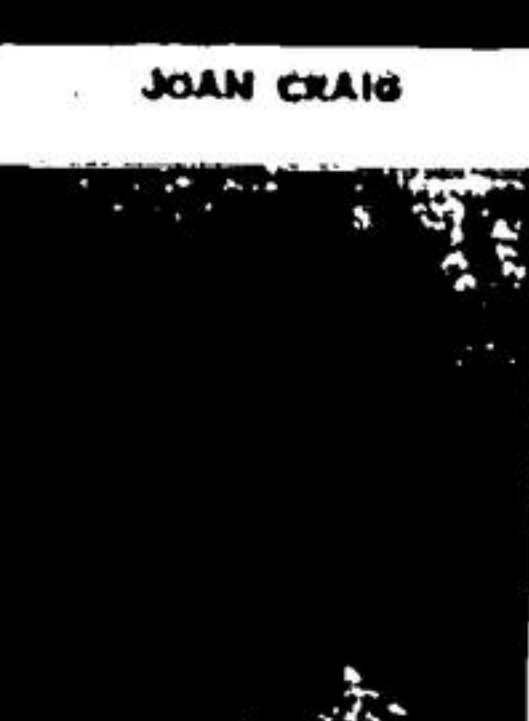
