In American League play Cleveland clipped Chicago 12-4 with Gary Stump the winning pitcher. Big blow for the Indians was Dave Clark's bases loaded home run in the fourth inning. New York Yankees beat Minnesota 8-3 with Blackwell, the Yankee shortstop, hitting 3 for 3.

Detroit, led by Kansas City by 11 runs to nine with Maudin and Prasnowski each hitting a double and single to drive in three runs apiece for the winners. For Kansas City, Ramsey Hay was the big hitter as he batted 3 for 3.

The Boston Red Sox came up with four runs in the last inning and that was enough to beat Baltimore 9-5. Boston got power hitting from Reg Lavee, Dwayne Hay and Robbie Fry, all hit triplex. Mitch Zamojed led off the final frame for Baltimore with a triple, but the next three batters struck out. Gerry Guzak and Benny Heppes hit two baggers for the losers.

The Cardinals and the Giants battled to a four all tie in their National League feature. It was the Braves over the Dodgers by a 1-1 tie. There was a single National League game played on Thursday but we were unable to get the score this week.

Dick Licata Hosts Lions Golf Night

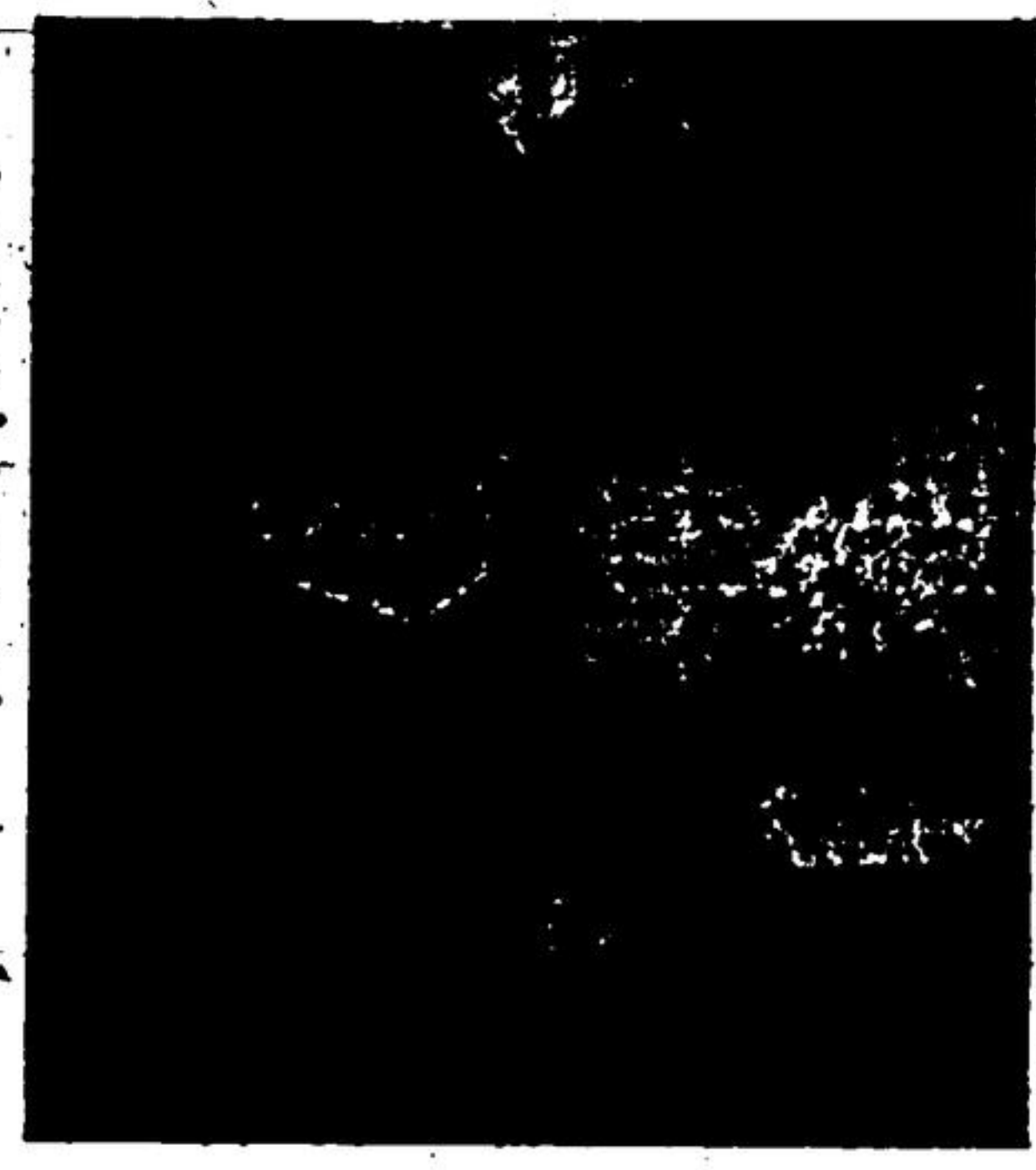


The Lions were loose at North Halton Golf and Country Club when charter member Dick Licata hosted the local club at his annual golf night recently.
