

BARBARA FINLAY, 78.1% HEADS SCHOOL GRADS

OTHERS PLACE WELL IN GRADE 13 EXAMS

With a percentage of 78.1% in her best eight subjects eleven written, Barbara Finlay was top student in the Grade 13 graduating class at Georgetown High School this year.

Barbara failed 7 firsts and 4 seconds in her exam results which were released Tuesday by the Dept. of Education.

Other Georgetown students who placed well in the exams include Ross Baird, 4 firsts, one second and three thirds; Diane Dutchburn, 3 firsts, 2 seconds and one third; and Monty Hyde, 3 firsts and 4 seconds.

This year, by a decision of the Ontario Headmasters' Association, actual marks were not released to the press. Instead, the list supplied by the local high school, include only the subjects passed without specifying the marks obtained.

Press Subdividers to Complete New Roads

Action to have subdividers put roads in shape for the town was suggested by Mayor Sargent Monday following reading of a communication from the town's insurance underwriters which turned down responsibility for claimed damage to cars on Todd Road.

The street is in part of the Delrex subdivision where roads have not been turned over to the town.

"I'm glad you brought that up," said Cr. Fred Harrison. "There's a road through the Lane subdivision which is in bad shape too."

Mr. Harrison said houses in that subdivision were started four years ago, and the road hasn't been improved since.

"These residents are assessed taxes the same as anyone else and should have a decent road," he claimed.

At this stage a letter was read from the Department of Municipal Affairs from whom council had asked advice recently about forcing subdividers to finish roads.

The department said it is up to council and the town solicitor to decide on any such action.

Road Program is Now in Progress

Georgetown's summer road program is in full swing, according to road chairman Fred Harrison.

He told council Monday that work has started on a new bridge on Ontario Street and improvements on Valleyview Road, and a storm sewer has been installed on Delrex Blvd. Surface treatment is starting on a number of town roads this week and final surfacing of Main Street had been slated to begin the next day, he said.

New Lapel Badges For Ambulancemen

At a general meeting held recently in the new Ambulance garage administration room, with over fifty members present, the new lapel badge was presented to all active members. Badges were bought with G.V.A.S. funds.

Many business matters were discussed, including the changing of the By-law covering drivers. Formerly it was required that all drivers be licensed as chauffeurs, but new regulations now enable drivers with operator's licence only to become members provided they meet all requirements of the Police Department and the G.V.A.S. Officers were discussed for the official opening of the new garage and Mr. Harrison Wood was appointed chairman of the committee to deal with this.

It was pointed out that the Executive had met with the Ambulance Chairman, Mr. John Elliott, and had been able to make many helpful decisions in reducing the cost of the garage building. Since its construction, a great deal of the painting has been done by the members with a view to keeping down costs for the Corporation. The garage is a tremendous morale booster to the Volunteer Ambulance Service, in that it is a real credit to the area and provides a proper meeting place for the Service at all times.

More Water Shut-offs Threat to Delinquents

More water shut-offs were threatened Monday by Deputy Reeve Wm. F. Hunter when he told council some delinquent taxpayers are wincing on their agreements to pay arrears over a period of time.

"They made their own terms and aren't living up to them, and we have no alternative but to shut water off," he said.

In a previous campaign when several services were disconnected all but one has made arrangements, he said. The one household is still without water.

Recently the Canadian National Railways was one of several industrial users who applied for exemption from paying the 50% sewerage surcharge on water rates because they do not use sewer facilities.

Monday some councillors moved to exempt the railway, but others were of the opinion that the CNR must hook up to sewers which pass their property.

Cr. Jim Emmerson recited a clause in a by-law which dem-

ands abandoning cess-pools or septic tanks when sewerage is available. No decision was made on the question that night.

Welfare Administrator Must Abandon Post

Georgetown will be seeking a new welfare administrator after the end of this month. But council does not expect to be flooded with applications for the position.

Because of the salary. Or rather the lack of same. For over a year Allan Norton has carried on in the position as a dollar-a-year man, Mr. Norton, a former councillor and deputy reeve volunteered to take the post over a year ago. Formerly it was one of the multitude of chores assigned to the town clerk.

Now he has found that his job as insurance agent precludes him from the post and he will relinquish it on August 31st.

Councillors discussed the matter briefly Monday and came up with no solution. If a successor is not appointed immediately town clerk C. G. Benham will have the job back on his hands in September.

Hornby got great pitching from Lois Galt to eliminate Omagh in three straight games shutting out the opposition in the last two clashes, 10-0, and 6-0. The third game was played Monday night when Hornby girls scored all six runs in the first inning.

They are waiting for a winner in the other series which Glen Williams girls currently lead, two games to one. Palermo won the opener 17-13 last Thursday, but the Glen came back to cop the next two 20 to 3, and 12 to 1, the third one being played Monday night. The fourth game of that series is tonight (Thursday) when the Glen and Palermo meet at Hornby park.

Two Youths Killed In Terra Cotta Crash

CNR Crossing to Mills Is Closed Permanently

Council Studies Alternative Route

Suspected for some time, since improvements began in the Canadian National Railway yard, the crossing to the papermills is no more.

Mill employees, accustomed for generations to use a private crossing in the vicinity of the station, must continue to use a roundabout entrance from the 9th Line or Victoria Street. And increased traffic under the John St. subway will aggravate a traffic problem which has always existed.

Monday, council received a letter from the railway saying to be a town road, it is actually private. Maintenance has been stopped because of increased rail-traffic. The crossing is being closed as a safety measure to both vehicles and pedestrians. The road to the mills has been there as long as any living residents can remember.

A Full Time Fire Chief Prospect of Near Future

A full-time fire chief for Georgetown is in Georgetown's future, Cr. Don Barrager believes.

Monday council receives a letter from the Attorney General's department detailing findings of a coroner's jury after a local man lost his life in a basement apartment fire.

Regular inspection of all such buildings was recommended. But this would pose a problem for a municipality which does not have a full-time building inspector and feels it cannot afford such a position.

Cr. Barrager said a number of fire department members are qualified inspectors and the department might co-operate in inspecting residential buildings as well as industrial and commercial establishments where a regular yearly check is made. "It would be a safety advantage to residents," he said.

Later Cr. Barrager said appointment of a full-time fire chief might be the final answer. "We're getting to the stage where this might be desirable," he feels.

Cr. Harrison said if council does not intend to enforce regulations there is no use starting

Excavation Hazards Covered by By-Law

Georgetown now has a by-law providing penalties to property owners who allow hazards to exist on their properties.

Third reading was given Monday to the by-law which is particularly aimed at unprotected excavations which council feels form a menace to children when they fill with water.

From now on any excavation over three feet deep must be properly fenced.

Lions Jamboree Returns to Arena

The Lions Club will hold their annual Jamboree back in the old stand this year, the Arena, but with a decided improvement. With the new concrete floor installed, no dust storms will be kicked up to give the hot dogs that gritty flavour.

Friday and Saturday, September 14th and 15th, will see the barkers beckoning and the games of chance challenging the skill and luck of all comers.

Climaxing the show will be the draw for the 62 Ford Fairlane 500, which will be made late Saturday night. It is hoped to have Dr. Harry Harley, M.P. present to draw the winning ticket. This year the draw tickets are five dollars each, half the cost of previous years.

By-Law Names Hewson Georgetown Solicitor

Council on Monday approved two readings of a by-law appointing George C. Hewson as official town solicitor. The appointment will be confirmed with third reading next week.

This will clear a somewhat confusing situation incurred by disbanding of the Hewson, Ord & Helson law firm recently. Mr. Hewson had originally acted as solicitor, but for the past few years other members of the firm have shared the duties.

When a motion was made a week ago to have a by-law proposed, it had been found that there was no record in the town books of any appointment ever being made.

Cr. Harrison, who with Cr. Barrager, made the motion, had previously claimed this. "I've been accused of slipping, but my name on this motion shows I was only after in-
