Third Straight Win for Local Swimming Team

Georgetown swimmers are beginning to think in terms of a clean sweep of their six meet series of competitions with Brampton and Orangeville swimmers.

The local stokers made it three straight wins Thursday in Orangeville when they piled up 45 1/2 points to leave the other two teams far behind. Brampton scrambled back into second this time with a 28 point total, and the host club trailed with 22 1/2.

1500 Pigeons Wing Their Way From Georgetown

The CNE station in Georgetown was the starting point for a mammoth cross-country race on Saturday morning, with more than 1500 entrants. Viciously excited and anxious to begin, the contestants milled about on the landing platform, jostled each other to gain a better starting position and gulped down a last drink of water before taking off on their far destinations 160 miles distant.

The price for all this? Probably a package of deluxe blooded, since all the participants were pigeons.

Sixty-three crates of the specially trained birds arrived in Georgetown by freight train early Saturday morning. They came from London, Stratford, St. Thomas, Sarnia, St. Mary's, Welland and Niagara Falls to be released at the station here for a three day race.

Yong clubs from London were in actual neck and neck competition for speed, while the others were only racing their own time-distance records.

Increased interest in this sport in Canada is evidenced by the number of bandings taking place each year. Ontario pigeon clubs report that more than 80,000 baby pigeons have been banded to date this year. Some trainers have even imported eggs all the way from Ireland.

The care and training of the birds pays off for the trainers with the thrill of seeing their birds in action, as they were here on Saturday. In a show as spectacular in its way as a miniature CNE air show the 1575 pigeons beat their way out of the crates, hesitated briefly to establish directions, then disappeared over the trees tops in a flurry of wings, leaving a number of red ink marked feathers in the station yard as souvenirs of their visit.
