Defer Town Dam in Conservation Plan

An extensive cost-benefit study has resulted in the Credit Valley Conservation Authority drastically paring its flood control scheme. The move should find favor with the Federal Government which will be asked to pay part of the project's cost. The authority originally planned a program of six dams and reservoirs and three river channels at a total cost of \$5,496,820. Small in area and with limited financing, the Authority took a second look at the plan. As a result of the study the authority found that two of the proposed dams could be deferred, reducing the cost to \$2,958,020 and still retain better than 70 per cent of the flood control and improved stream flow benefits of the scheme. The revised scheme is soon to be submitted to the federal and provincial governments. Each will be asked to pay 37 per cent of its cost. The remaining 25 per cent will be paid by the authority's 16 member municipalities. The first and most important part of the program calls for the construction of dams and reservoirs at Orangeville and Cataract in the upper regions of the watershed and channel improvements at Glen Williams, Meadowvale and Churchville, in the watershed's middle region. Total cost of these works is \$1,293,820. The works are proposed to be completed over a three-year period. The authority has already acquired 321 acres of 400 acres needed for the Orangeville dam and much of the site has been cleared. Cost of the dam is \$400,420. The Cataract dam, south of Orangeville will be located on a 508-acre site. Its cost is estimated at \$788,400. Other dams and reservoirs are proposed for Silver Creek, three miles above Georgetown, and at Belfountain. The Silver Creek dam will create a 200-acre lake and cost \$872,600. It is well situated to increase stream flow to ease heavy pollution in the river now emanating from Georgetown and Acton. The Belfountain will create a reservoir 2.5 miles long by about 800 feet wide and cost an estimated \$791,600. Deferred from the program is proposed \$1,394,300 dam and reservoir at Glen Williams and a \$1,144,500 dam and reservoir at Georgetown. The study indicated that the cost per acre foot of water storage for the Glen Williams and Georgetown dams was excessively high. The rugged topography of the Credit Valley provides some of the most beautiful scenery in Ontario and lends itself well to the development of open space and conservation areas. The upper regions of the watershed provide some of the best fishing within 100 miles of Toronto. Sixty severe floods have been recorded in the watershed since 1797, yet at many times during the year the river is reduced to a mere trickle. The Town of Streetsville is the only municipality drawing its domestic water supply from the river. But industry in Acton, Alton, Chellenham and Georgetown are dependent upon river water for their operations. Extensive industrial develop-
