(Continued from Page 4) ating companies on the Steep Rock iron ore range in May, 1961. They went directly to the Prime Minister and urged him to act in the interests of the national economic policy. Only recently the rate schedule was revised and on the basis of 1962 shipments, the new structure will save the three companies \$1,000,000 per year. They worked three years to elicit north-south air passenger services and in 1960 North Central Airlines of Minneapolis inaugurated such a service. They urged reciprocal truck licensing by Canadian provinces, and they pointed out that 90 per cent of truck transport traffic originating in eastern Canada key centres and destined for the Canadian west passed through the U.S. Thus, the revenue from this traffic was lost to Canada. The result was that the Ontario government devised a formula for truck licensing and already had entered into agreements with other provinces. The area council made its voice heard in the field of education and now, apart from Lakehead College, several vocational and technical training schools, to be financed jointly by federal and provincial coffers, are underway at a cost of \$7,000,000. Not only does the council as a whole keep up a sustained drive for betterment, but individual communities reach out and promote their own districts.

### THE TOURISTS COME

For instance, Allan Sherrett, manager of Kenora's tourist program, travels each winter as far south as the Gulf of Mexico, carrying the message of the beauties and wonders of the Lake of the Woods. The results? More than 500 resorts and outfitters are in the area and \$15,000,000 in new wealth is generated annually. Eighteen months before the opening of the Trans-Canada Highway, the Development group helped organize an international highway association to promote circular tours along the Superior shore. They practically flooded every outdoor publication in Canada and the United States. What happened was that tourist volume increased 100 per cent in the Lakehead. Now, for the past five years, they have been in close liaison with the Mississippi River Parkway Commission, spurring for completion of a scenic driveway paralleling the great river from the gulf and extending north to join the Trans-Canada Highway near Kenora. The reasons? Better international relations, and a potential of 30,000,000 people living in all states in the Mississippi Valley. The payoff, naturally, is attraction of industrial and commercial outlets, opening up employment opportunities, especially to the youth of northwestern Ontario. In brief, the realists who have done and continue to do this spartan community work, have moulded a program of attraction that is hard to resist.
