DISTRICT NEWS AT A GLANCE

ACTON
Acton Planning Board Wednesday evening approved the construction of a block of four stores in the Glenlea subdivision area. Plans for the stores began early last year, but were held up when the planning board refused a permit on the grounds the area was zoned residential. Since that time it has been changed to commercial.

MILTON
Milton's new community swimming pool moved one step closer to reality last Wednesday night as members of the swimming pool committee authorized calling tenders for the 60 x 100 ft. structure, to be erected in Rotary Park.
To date, the committee has over \$30,000 pledged or donated, well over 50 per cent of the objective.

ORANGEVILLE
A 391 acre reservoir is planned for the northeast corner of Orangeville as part of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority plan for control on the Credit River, which recommends reservoirs at Orangeville, Erin, Cataract, Silvercreek, Georgetown and Glen Williams. The Orangeville reservoir has highest priority since it is at the head waters. The municipality is asked to pay 25 per cent of the proposed cost of the project, estimated at more than \$400,000.

BRIN
Army Cadet Gary Benako, R. R. 1, Erin, has been selected as the best cadet in his company at Ipperwash cadet camp. Two cadets are chosen from each of the 11 companies.

DISTRICT NEWS AT A GLANCE

BURLINGTON
The Burlington learn-to-swim program has been the most successful to date. A total of 2600 are registered in the classes, an increase of a thousand over last year.

STREETSVILLE
Hill Clark Francis, developer of Streetville's mid town A&P shopping plaza, are preparing a proposal for the town's first liquor store. The proposal has been requested by the Ontario Liquor Commission. Rental estimates will involve 4,000 square feet of space.

TORONTO TOWNSHIP
Toronto Township Council has filed a petition with the Governor-General protesting the installation of five level crossings in the Malton area, which will reportedly carry 30 trains per day. Council members called the plan "misconceived and short-sighted" since it will endanger their plan to provide ultimate protection at all railway crossings.

BOLTON
Bolton Post Office was moved to a new location away from the business section last Wednesday. A petition of protest from downtown businessmen sent to Ottawa received no recognition.

Hog Cholera Seems Nearing an End

Only one case of hog cholera has been reported in more than a week, Canada Dept. of Agriculture's Health of Animals Division said today.

The case - involving the slaughter of 81 hogs - occurred in Quebec's St. Maurice County. It is only the second reported since August 10th and federal veterinarians are confident that that epidemic, which broke out about mid-July, is near an end. The case reported the previous week occurred in Glangary County, Ont.

Meanwhile, the Health of Animals Division is planning to lift a ban on hogs showing at fairs and exhibitions in Hastings county and west in Ontario provided no further cases are reported by September 1st. However the federal quarantine will continue on all community auction premises in the two provinces. The measure applies to the handling of feeder and suckling pigs.
