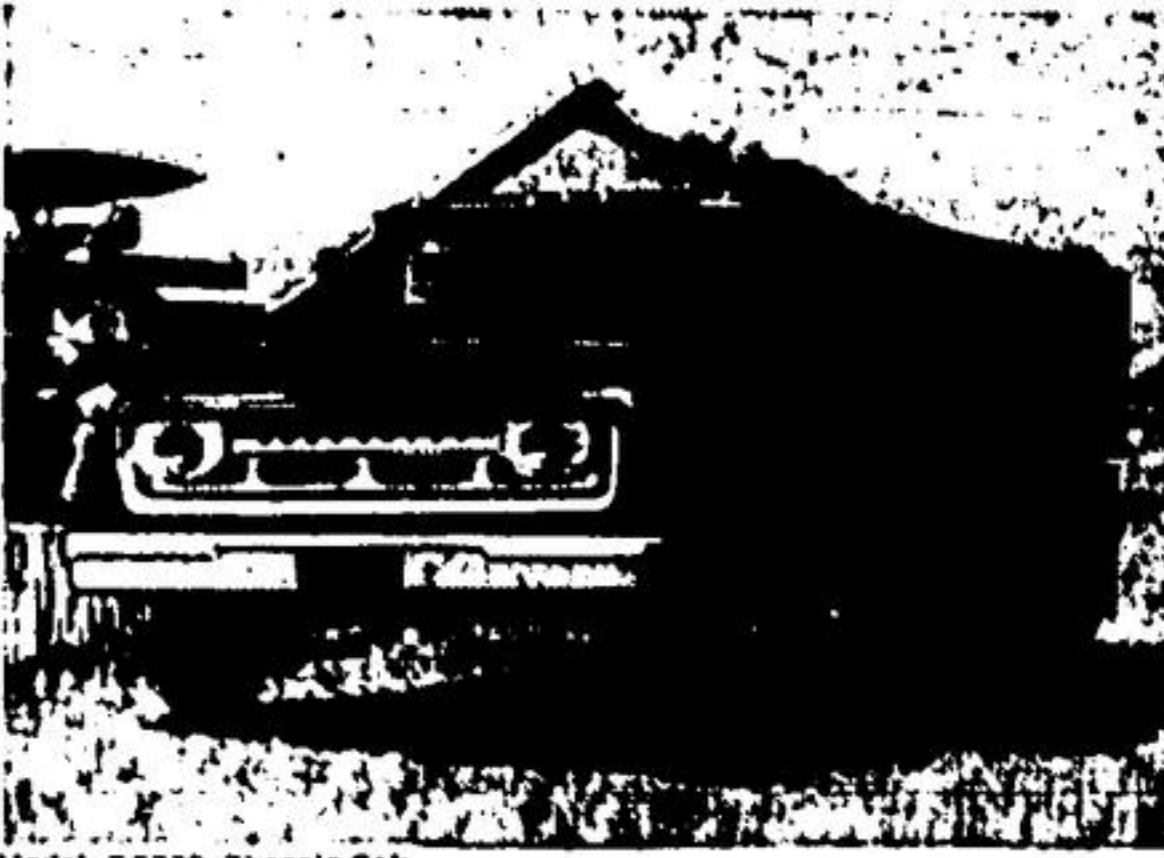

Model C1000 Panel



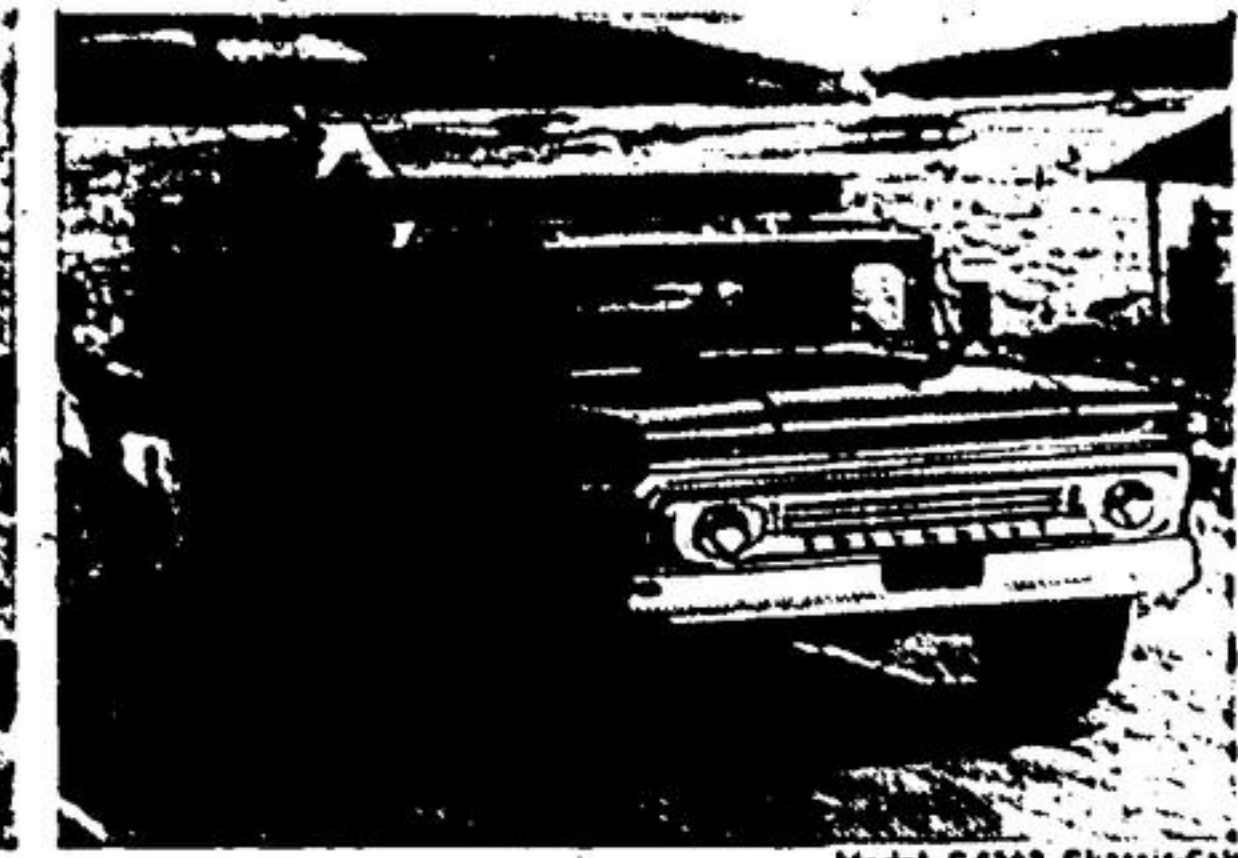
Model C2524 Pick-up (Front View)

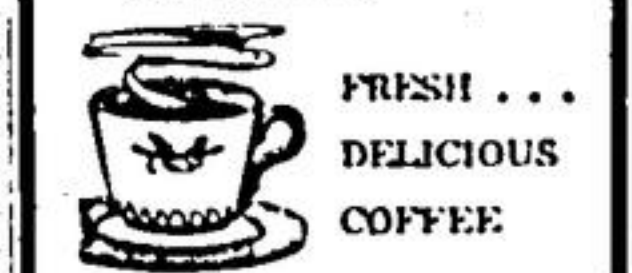

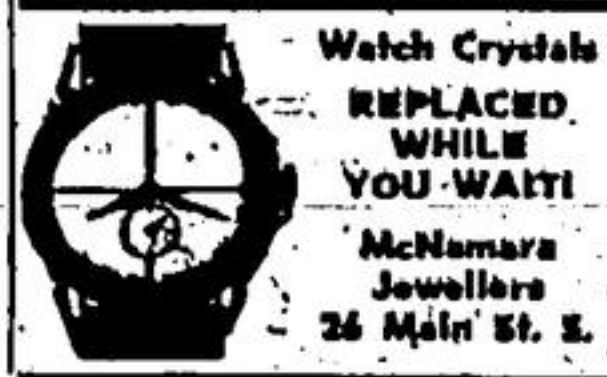
Cat, Ron Rankine who made the investigation placed the damage to the car at \$700. The mishap occurred at about 10.25 p.m.
