REQUESSING COUNCIL

Mackenzie Contracts New Municipal Hall

The new Requeasing Municipal building on the 7th line just west of the Check Lane, will be built by J. B. Mackenzie & Son, at a cost of \$71,465. The tender was awarded at this week's Requeasing council meeting.

The building will be started immediately in an attempt to beat the cold weather. Situated on five acres of the Charles Greig farm, the 85' x 33' building was designed by architect Don Hallford of Oakville.

A total value of \$241,500 in building permits was issued during August, building inspector Wm. Hulla reported to the council. \$175,000 represented industrial assessment, and \$66,500 residential.

A Smith and Stone addition accounted for \$75,000 and 'Big Daddy' Fred Gardiner's Acton limestone quarries made up the remaining \$100,000 of the industrial permits.

One hundred and fifty five chickens were killed by dogs on the Charles Cutts farm, poultry evaluator Neilson Stark told Council. The Rhode Island Reds were 3 1/2 months old, and Mr. Stark felt \$170 each would be a fair reimbursement. The motion to pay this amount was passed.

A colourful and humorous letter from Mr. C. Miller was read, protesting the condition of a wrecking yard. Attached to the letter was a clipping from the Herald which listed some of the provisions of the wrecking yard by-law.

All three high school boards — Acton, Milton and Georgetown will receive one half of Requeasing's 1962 levy, immediately, and the other half after taxes are due October 15th.

George Currie was appointed Requeasing's representative to the Sixteen Mile Creek Conservation Authority to fill the vacancy created by the death of Wilfred Bird.

McDowell is New School Inspector

The Halton County public school inspector have been changed this year, with the appointment of J. R. F. Bornhold as an assistant superintendent of elementary education with the Department of Education at Toronto.

O. G. McDowell, who has been associated with Mr. Bornhold this past year, becomes inspector in charge of Halton No. 1, including schools in Requeasing, Nassagaweya and Georgetown. W. L. McNeill remains in charge of the No. 2 Halton Inspectorate, covering Acton, Milton and portions of East Flamboro, Burlington and Oakville, because of their growth of school population, have separate inspectorates under their own Boards of Education.
