



Soon to Lay Track For CNR to Milton

Signal Installation is Proceeding Here

(Toronto) Teams of construction and railway crews continue to maintain the on-schedule work program for Canadian National's Toronto Terminal Project. It includes a 34-mile access-line and 1200-car freight classification yard slated for completion by year 1965.

In the west, the Henderson Ave. subway and the Woodbine bridge separating rail access line traffic from roads have been completed, reported John L. Cann, project director.

Subway to be ready by Sept. 30. Bridges are to be completed at the West and Main Street River sites, Cross Street subdivision, Wood Street bridge, and subways at Henderson Ave., Rathburn and Jane Sts., Mr. Cann said.

By mid-October the subway at the Seventh Line, Vaughan Township is to be ready and by the end of the month the east and west Don River bridges and subways at Bayview Ave. and Balfour St. will be completed.

Grading of various sections of the access-line from Milton to Toronto ranged from 60 to 90 per cent complete. By Oct. 1, track laying crews will begin laying ties on the section between Georgetown and Milton and building operations will be carried out concurrently.

Considerable installation of signals has been made at Georgetown and this work is continuing at Dunbar to the Mountbatten CN subdivision. Signal cables to be laid this fall on the Milton subdivision between here and Georgetown.

Clearing and fencing of the right-of-way between Dunbar and the Bala subdivision has begun and to be completed by November 30, the project engineer said.

CN Telecommunications engineers and technicians now are working with their railway counterparts on aspects of signal and telecommunications for the project.

Turning from the access-line to the yard, 24 1/2 miles of track have been laid in the yard to date this year and 100 miles have been installed. Some 80 miles of track are to be laid by year's end. The yard is laid by yards and Keel St. with its entrance at Highway No. 7.

Two hump bridges and a bridge separating road and rail traffic at Sherwood road are nearing completion.

Six More Bridges

In both the access line and yard field offices plans are being completed for remaining work. Within the next month, contracts are to be advertised for six more bridges and grade separations on the access-line. Contracts for six buildings to be constructed in the yard are also to be advertised in the near future.

All of the access line will be signalled by Centralized Traffic Control while inside the yard a complex of television, two-way radio, radar, electronic equipment and analog computers will be utilized to sort out freight trains utilizing gravity flow. Some 7,000 cars a day can be handled at what will be the Toronto Yard.

Similar CN yards now are operational in Moncton, Montreal and Winnipeg.

Demands Rescinding Of Agreement Bylaw

I would appreciate your printing the following discourse made to council on their Sept. 4th meeting:

Mr. Mayor and Councilors:

On or about Aug. 20th this Council agreed to release 1163 more lots to Delrex Developments for building homes. And going over past and present news in our weekly papers have come up with some startling information that is of vital interest to ALL the taxpayers of Georgetown.

rejoiced that Delrex was about to address for a called meeting to explain why they continued to build more and more homes at a cost of a million dollars to the taxpayers for sewage disposal knowing at the same time that their industrial land was unsaleable without the proper sewage disposal.

Mr. Mayor, you and your associates about the taxpaying public from a committee meeting in regards to the town works department. You forgot that those employees were paid with the taxpayers money and they have a right to know where their money is spent. If a Government probe was ordered I am reasonably sure that it would be done in the open just like a recent court case we have in mind.

Going back to the full page ad by Delrex I quote "Delrex Developments planned 3,600 homes and 100 industries" by November 12, 1950, they admit that they had built 926 homes already. But where was the promised industry? They were released a further 506 lots for building and now another 1,163 more. Delrex is thus well on their way to the 3,600 homes that was their goal while the taxpayer is faced with unmountable taxes for schools, sewage and water, etc.

Most of Georgetown home owners are paying as much for taxes and water today as they were paying for rent a few years ago. Georgetown is quoted as annexing 1,800 acres of land for Delrex Developments. I disagree. It should be quoted as follows: Delrex annexed Georgetown and Georgetown foot the bill. Mr. Mayor and Councilors I have no wish to be here tonight, my desire is to live the rest of my days in peace and quiet. This I cannot do because my living depends on the income from my property and we are being taxed beyond all reason. I am filled with righteous indignation for my fellow citizens. These people are my friends and relatives. This is my home town and this Council deliberately ignores a petition by one thousand of its people in order to cater to the wishes of one developer. We have tried to provide comfortable low cost apartments since 1939 for people who cannot afford to pay \$40 per month rent. I am sure that another aspect of what that building means to us and to others. For 11 years we have set aside a small portion of that building for the Worship of our Eternal Creator who revealed his name to Moses in Exodus — chapter 6, v. 3 as Jehovah. In that Hall, a group of dedicated Jehovah's Witnesses study God's word and strive to teach others of God's laws and purposes for us and all mankind when God first revealed his name to Moses, his people were down in Egypt, in slavery to Pharaoh the king of Egypt. On August 20th, the Delrex manager charged this Council with mismanagement and stated that Delrex has been charged taxes for 8 years on industrial land that is virtually un-saleable.

Mr. Mayor and Councilors, don't you think it strange that Delrex has kept silent for eight years about this lack of sewage facilities long ago?

I quote from Delrex full page ad once again, "Delrex has, and will finance factory buildings for industries that will locate here. This takes a substantial amount of money and we rely on the sale of land to provide funds." But what has Delrex done with the funds received from the sale of lands? Since we have little industry to show for those funds, it would seem that Delrex must have used them for more homes. Now, Delrex no longer claims a lack of sewage facilities makes industrial land un-saleable. The threatened action for redress against this town was just one more smoke screen to fool the public and scare this council into releasing what was probably the balance of those 3,600 lots for homes.

In less than half an hour, Council has once again betrayed the interest of the taxpayer by releasing 1,163 more lots for building homes. Why? Mr. Mayor and Councilors, What Do You Fear? It is exposure for past commitments to Delrex, would it not be better to face the music now while we still have a vestige of honour left, than to face it later when we have completed the ruin of this town?

Make no mistake about it, Truth Will Come Out. Aug. 31 Telegram headlines tell us — "Town's works dept. faces probe." Mr. Mayor, not only the town works dept. needs a probe, but the action of Council from the year 1954 and those who have consistently agreed to any and all the proposals put forth by Delrex Developments since that date. Our government and others have a way of grabbing the why and the wherefore of individual actions. Instead of council being released into releasing those 1,163 more lots, it should have
