Rebels Football Season Opens at Park Friday

Guelph Here For Exhibition Tilt

Head coach Lyn McLaren is trying himself in knots these afternoons to contain a powerful urge to grin like Lewis Carroll's well dentured cat. To find the reason you don't have to look beyond the armoured bodies colliding with each other on the high school's back forty every school day from about 4 o'clock until supper time. They are collectively the 1962 edition of the Georgetown High School's Senior Football team and head coach McLaren will with a little coaxing admit that they are undoubtedly the healthiest and most promising aggregation of head-bunters since he first assembled a red and blue tide a few years back. How healthy and how promising will be determined later tomorrow afternoon (Friday). That's when the gridiron reps from the John F. Ross Second School in Guelph (totaling about 1,400) sink their teeth into the Georgetown Park turf and aim their well helmeted heads point blank at this town's best collection of football players in the first exhibition game for either team. The GHS Rebels (they bear no particular allegiance to Nick Adams) have had seven practices and the coaching staff reads its roster that all the rough ends have not been knocked off. But the fact that basically it is the same group that went through a good exhibition schedule and a regular schedule and CWSSA playoffs last year speaks well for the possibility of their jelling as a unit in their first trial of 1962. The starting game that worked successfully 12 months ago probably won't be on display in this one. During their workouts the Rebels have been sticking to the ground, throwing the odd aerial but not frequently enough to indicate they will use it to any extent against Guelph. Blocking assignments have been carried out with a consistency found rarely in a high school football squad and if Friday's just is half way suspicious. This, fundamentally, will be the reason. The starting offense is only slightly changed from last year. Jim Sparks' McGill will be the quarterback. Al Marchant the guards, Barney and Campbell the tackles, and Martel at right end. The left end spot is still a tossup. In the backfield with McGill will be Peter Forgrave at wingback, Bob Wrigglesworth at fullback, John Pennock at right half and Heppes, a junior last season, at left half. Backing up the quarterback will be Pete Lavell, who could see some action at quarterback so that McGill can become a running back. McGill is a powerful runner and Coach Lyn McLaren will try to work Lavell into the slot permanently so that McGill will be free to concentrate solely on carrying the ball, blocking and snaring passes. Lavell like Heppes is up from the Juniors as are Jeff Nurse, Dave Barrager, Keith Murray, Dick Page, Bradley, Currie and Adams. Defensively it will be mainly the same line but with Abel Frankroyer at middle guard, Jeff Nurse and Murray Marchment the defensive ends, inside linebacker, two either Peter Forgrave, Bradley and Currie, outside linebackers Gord Lee and Keith Murray, defensive halves, two of either Adams, Wrigglesworth, McGill and Pennock, and Pete Lavell at the safety spot. Coers who should get action are Dave McLeod, a wingback, Bruce Quigley, a left end, Harold Schouten, another end, and Ralph Tripp a defensive tackle. Unknown quantities are new

corners, Chusholm from Milton, and Neil from New Luskard. Helping the head coach are Pete Bright an OAC grad who played line for the Aggies and who is directing the line, Gary Treter and Roger Carey who are directing the defense and Wayne Sprout who is assisting. There will be only one other exhibition game that scheduled for the 21st under the lights in Kitchener where GHS will take on St. Jerome's. The regular
