Crossing Problem Poses School Child Problem

Jointly perturbed about danger to pedestrians on the Mountainview railway bridge and children crossing the railway tracks enroute to school, council and the public school board will take action to solve a problem created by closing of a right-of-way across the CNR station tracks.

The school board told council by letter Monday that sixty children from the northern end of town must travel the Mountainview route now, across a bridge not designed for pedestrians and where traffic has increased since the railway took action.

**Patrol Bridge**  
Councillors expressed various ideas of what might be done as a temporary measure, the police force will patrol the bridge area when children are crossing, and council suggested crossing guards at any location where children could be centralized.

Meanwhile, discussions are going in with the Dept. of Transport, CNR and county about widening of the Mountainview and Main Street railway bridges. There is \$500 invested in a possible overhead pedestrian crossing in the station area.

**Most Sald**  
Jack Graham, who asked recently that council take some action, again visited Monday meeting and presented a petition signed by over 200 residents asking council to invest in the public's legal rights at the closed crossing and where their Rosetta St. continues as a street allowance across the tracks to King St. and if so, take action to have the railway provide a crossing there.

Mr. Emmerson explained that he had been investigating and finds that most of the original crossings has been sold to the CNR. A crossing at Elgin St. is marked on a 1923 map, while there is some possibility that a Union St. crossing exists, but he has no definite information on either, he said.

**Big Tomato**

**Answered Questions**

Included in the show will be classes of senior heifer calves, junior heifer calves, and a class for steers. Each 411 member will compete in Showmanship, and will be finally placed on their overall participation during the Club year.

The conclusion of the Show will be the selection of a champion beef, dairy, and overall livestock showman.

The Junior Day will feature exhibits from each 411 agricultural, 411 Homemaking, Junior Farmer, and Junior Institute Club. The entire show will represent the work of over four hundred young men and women from Halton's farms.
