# Show Sewer, Water Utilities To Board

And the band played on — and on — and on. It was the Acton Citizens Band and they played upstairs above the meeting place of the North Haldon Urban Board last Wednesday.

The Urban Board members, competing with them furiously raising their voices, until a full in the music disclosed they were shouting.

It was a brief meeting, due not only to music, but earlier a tour of Acton's sewage and water facilities took up two hours' time.

At the request of the Board, Jerry Addison, President of the North Haldon Retarded Children's Association, appeared to explain the financial structure of the Sunshine School. The request arose from a resolution passed by the Board asking the Province for the same grants towards Retarded Children's Schools as toward public schools. In reply Mr. J. Beatty of the Dept. of Education claimed the grants were the same.

Mr. Addison showed that this claim is basically correct, however, the costs of educating a retarded child are so much greater than that of the so-called normal child.

Using Milton figures, he said — "The cost of educating a public school child is \$390. Of this amount the province paid \$117, and Milton \$173 in contrast," he continued, "the cost of educating a retarded child is \$527. Of this amount the province paid \$250, and the Retarded Association \$277."

He also pointed out that the public school teachers' salaries per child is \$183, while teaching the retarded's salary per child is \$203. Not because the latter is paid more, or even as much, but because only a few retarded children can be handled by one teacher.

The very large cost of transportation was another factor, according to Mr. Addison. One hundred and ninety six miles per day are covered transporting the 16 pupils of Sunshine School. In addition, Schools for Retarded have to raise 60 per cent
