**Georgetown Cadets

Twenty-eight Georgetown

**Three Fire Calls
Over Week-End**

Only minor damages resulted
from three fires doused by fire-
men since last Thursday's re-
port.

Last Wednesday a grass fire
ignited by a pile of burning
rubbish burned out of control
on the Sheridan Nurseries prop-
erty near Georgetown Golf
and Country Club on the 10th
line, but firemen had little
trouble in killing the flames.
That was about 3 p.m.

Sunday morning at 7:10 fire-
men were summoned to the 6th
line farm of Bruce Lawrence,
when a stump fire was dis-
covered in flames. It is believed
to have started from a cigarette,
possibly discarded by a bu-
tler. The brigade poured water
on the stumps.

The most serious blaze of
the three was at 10 a.m. the
same day at the Terra Colla
home of Antonio Zilio. Oil
spilled on the basement floor
from a split in the oil line from
storage tank to furnace ignited
fire after a pump motor seized
up, however damage was mostly
the result of heavy smoke.

LASTING DAMAGE

Forest fire losses of mer-
chantable timber and property are
direct, tangible and readily ap-
parent. However, other damage
is not so clearly recognized.
Fire may kill the tiny young
trees and so destroy the mature
timber crop of 20, 50 or 100
years hence. Fire will change
the character of the forest.
Through repeated fires, millions
of acres will change from pro-
ductive forest land to unpro-
ductive wasteland.
