Wam Con Men Could Operate Here Too

Two men, posing as gas company inspectors, have been operating a highly dangerous confidence racket in Toronto. The Consumers' Gas Company in one day received six complaints that the "business artists" had gained entry into homes on the pretext of searching for gas leaks.

Serious Leak

Pouring alcohol on an inside gas line and igniting it, the con men had the home owner come into the basement and informed him that they had discovered a serious leak which needed immediate repair. The householder, panicked by the fire, was then told that the repair work would cost between \$3000 and \$4,200 and that an immediate deposit of \$200 or \$300 would be necessary.

Never Returned

If the owner became suspicious and threatened to call the gas company, the men offered to go to their cars to get their identification. However, they never returned.

A public announcement through the press by Consumers' Gas officials is believed to have frightened the men into leaving Toronto.

However, it is believed they may set up operations in another area where natural gas is distributed.

Avian Firm Now Public Company

Avian Aircraft has been converted from a private company to a public company. A company spokesman told The Herald this week that the conversion was agreed on at a meeting of Avian shareholders last Tuesday night in the Avian office on Mountbatten Rd.

The company, which produces the Avian 2-180 gyroplane, will be offering stock for sale to the public as soon as approval is received from the Securities Commission.

Jury Recommends Road Stop Signs

At an inquest last week into the death of James Sullivan, 15, and Eric Wilson, 43, both of Georgetown, a coroner's jury recommended that stop signs be placed at intersections in North Halton, where recommended by the Department of Transport.

Crown Attorney P. K. McWilliams pointed out that South Halton was well protected by stop signs, and drivers in North Halton should be given the same protection. The Crown Attorney added that stop signs in some communities are over-worked.

Unmarked Corner

The Georgetown men were killed as a result of a two car collision on June 24 at the intersection of 15 Sideroad and the Fifth Line, unmarked by stop signs. The driver of the second car, John Trumbull, 22, of R.R. 6, Milton, and his passenger, William McLaughlin suffered severe facial lacerations. Ontario Deaths Show Increase.

Ottawa (Special) — Number of deaths recorded in Ontario for the first seven months of this year shows a 37 per cent increase over the average of the last three years, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reports.

The seven month total this year is 21,535 compared to 30,827 for the corresponding 1961 period, and to 30,414, the three year average figure.

Deaths in July alone rose to 4,320 this year against 4,000 in July, 1961.

The number of births in the province dropped slightly to 92,362 to date this year, compared to 93,975 a year ago and 92,320, the three year average.

July births rose to 13,647 against 12,808 last July.

More marriages were recorded in July and for the first seven months of this year. The increase was 0.6 per cent to 22,051 compared to 23,819 for the same period a year ago.

The three year average 24,088 July marriages numbered 5,039 compared to 5,126 a year ago.
