Started Needle Works Factory In Georgetown

Mr. Leon Albert Cook, a resident of Georgetown for the past forty-five years died in 1917. He was born in Charles March 24th, 1907, survived town, New Hampshire, the son of Clara Ferguson and William Wallace Cook. He attended Lakeview and Walter Frederic Schools. From Franklen the grandchild, Lynda, Gordon, Debby, Kenny and Billie Selley, Vermont in 1905, living there until 1914 at which time they moved back to Franklen. After a year Mr. Selley and a niece Cook came to Paris, Ontario, where he pursued his trade as a needle maker taking left charge of the Charles Wheeler. In 1917 he Baptist Church, conducted the funeral service at the Harold started the Canada Needle Works, which was later sold to I. Creelman Limited. The Canada Needle Works was situated where the apartment building now is at 21 Water Street. During World War II he was employed at Harley Kay Marshland until he retired at the age of eighty.
