

Seek Garbage Disposal As a Municipal Service

Union Wants Town Drop Contracting

With tenders closing Friday for collection of garbage and disposal by sanitary landfill, Local 73 of the National Union of Public Service Employees made a strong plea to council Monday to make this a civic operation.

A lengthy brief was submitted, signed by James Dowell, NUPSE representative, Egan Madsen, local president and secretary George Stringer.

The union argues that contracting out undermines the structure of civic government and quoted surveys which are claimed to show that higher standards of sanitation prevail when collection is a civic operation.

Contractor's profit motive is incompatible with such high standards, the brief says and points out that equipment savings can be made by adopting garbage vehicles for other purposes.

Some Service
It is impossible for a private contractor to provide the same service as any municipal operation at less money, because of his profit need, the union claims. And the brief urges that council reconsider its tender call and seek advice on streamlining the present system.

At the same meeting strong criticism of the condition of the landfill site was expressed by a taxpayer Jack Graham, backed by several council members.

The union brief found some favour with Cr. Fred Harrison who said if there is the same trouble in future as there has been this year, he would favour municipal collection. He had toured the site that day with Cr. McNelly, he said and estimated 800 tons of garbage had been pushed over the river bank with no sign of landfill.

"Earlier this year we lost an industry because of burning garbage and to avoid this in future I think we should consider carefully," he said.

Deputy Reeve Hunter opposes municipal collection and thinks a new by-law "with teeth" will solve the problem. He is concerned about what would happen if this morning and it was a mess," said Cr. Emmerson. "I would say he is using the area method, but one half of a big area."

Reeve Elliott and Cr. Cock expressed similar sentiments.

Banded Knee
Deputy Reeve Hunter said the works superintendent should be telling the contractor what to do.

"It's brought it to the contractor's attention many many times, practically on banded knee and he gets only promises," said Cr. Harrison.

Council voted unanimously for the motion when Mayor Sargent stressed that quick action is necessary before the same garbage problems occur as in the past.

"What's his authority to be dealing with the matter?" quipped Cr. Harrison.

The mayor explained that Mr. East, although defeated in the recent election, still represents the party which will form the next federal government.

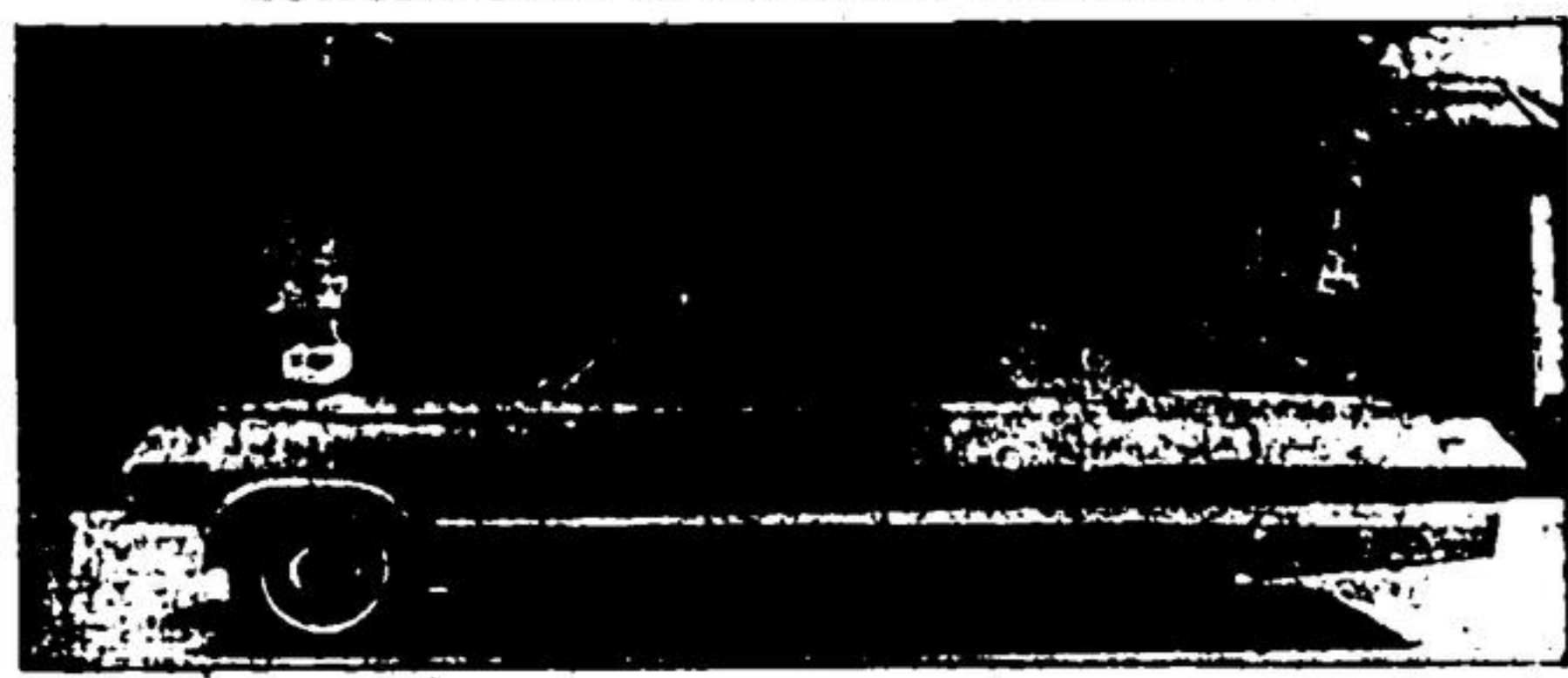
