### Seek Solution For School Water Supply

Some relief to a water shortage at Limehouse school appeared last Tuesday night, when Esquering school board members began negotiations for a fresh supply with O. Askin of Hornby, who owns adjoining property. Mr. Askin informed the board his water was supplied from running springs and believed the supply would be adequate to supply the school as well. In stating his willingness to cooperate with the board in obtaining water the homeowner told the board his supply would have to continue.

**CONSIDER SETTLEMENT**  
Board members asked if a long term lease might be available (in order to claim grants from the department) and were asked for a few days to consider the problem of a settlement.

At present water is being trucked to the Limehouse school at a cost of \$8.00 per thousand gallons and only a 500 gallon reserve tank is installed. Trustees expect to have an additional 500 gallon tank installed shortly.

Board member Mrs. Shirley Armstrong inquired regarding providing transportation for 19 children in the Norval area. She was told no arrangements had been made. Transportation chairman Bob Lawson said he would not agree to re-routing buses for this purpose as parents in other areas faced with the same problem would demand the same service and it would be impossible to provide this.

**WOULD INVESTIGATE**  
On two previous occasions a delegation from Norval had requested the board's consideration for transportation of their children and had been informed an investigation would be made.

Trustee Mac Sprowl, on learning that Esquering council was not too pleased with a

Mr. Sprowl argued that when Action Limehouse Quarries begins operations the crossing would be hazardous to motorists, especially buses carrying children. He claimed the view would be obstructed by railway cars on the siding when a through train was passing. Trustees Stanley Brown, Robert Lawson and the chairman disagreed with Mr. Sprowl's belief and contended the crossing didn't provide any great hazard if drivers drove with care. Mr. Sprowl pursued the subject and asked that a letter be sent to increase any power the council might have in urging installation of crossing signals. His wishes were discarded when the chairman read a resolution to adjourn the meeting which was approved.

- Heard a letter from Inspector O. G. McDowell regarding procedure for conducting regular, special and committee of the whole meetings. The letter emphasized the right of the public to attend Board meetings.

Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Hancock of Brampton spent Sunday with both their parents here.

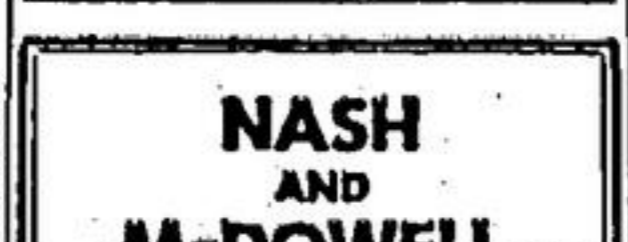

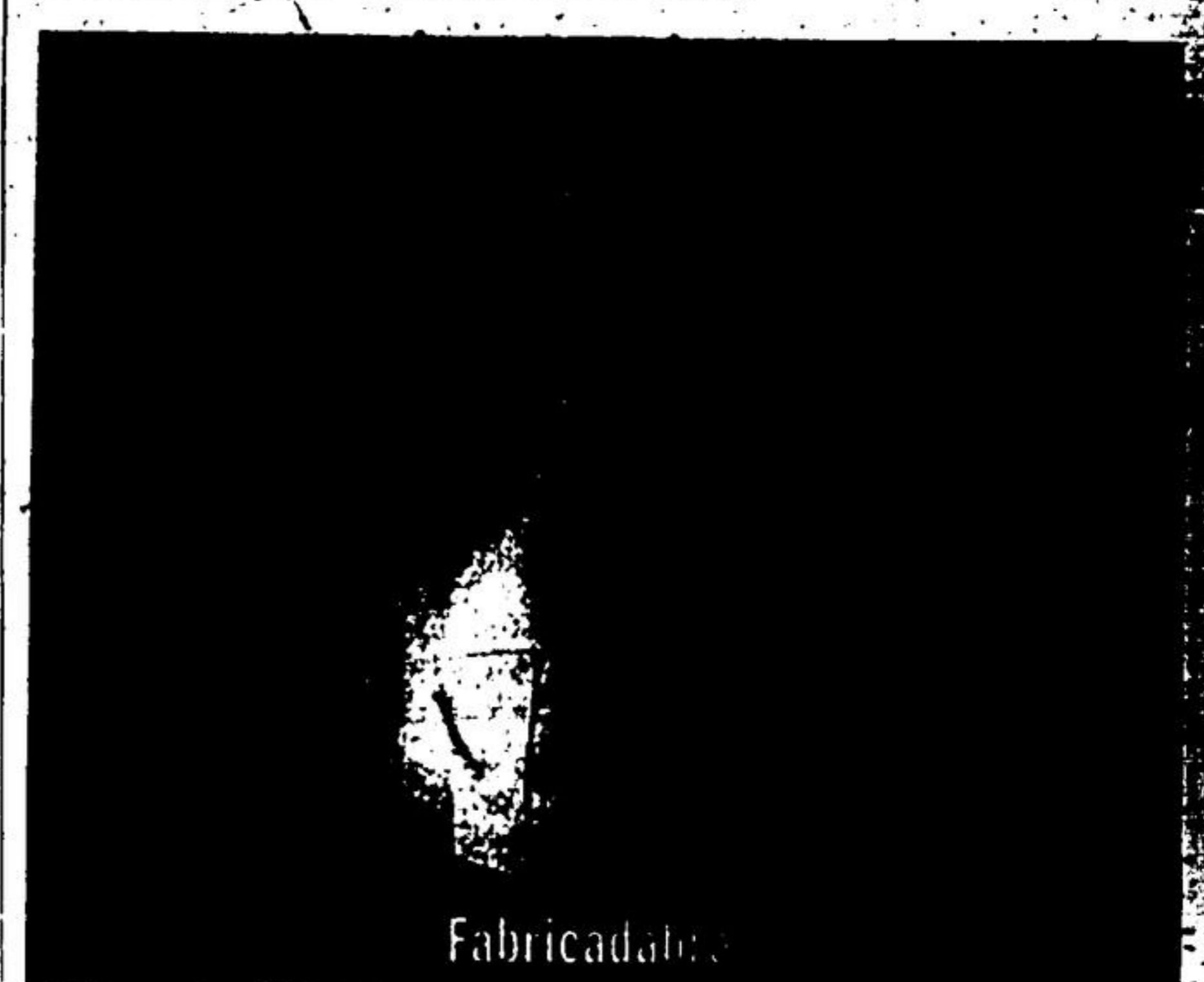
many interesting stories he had to tell them.

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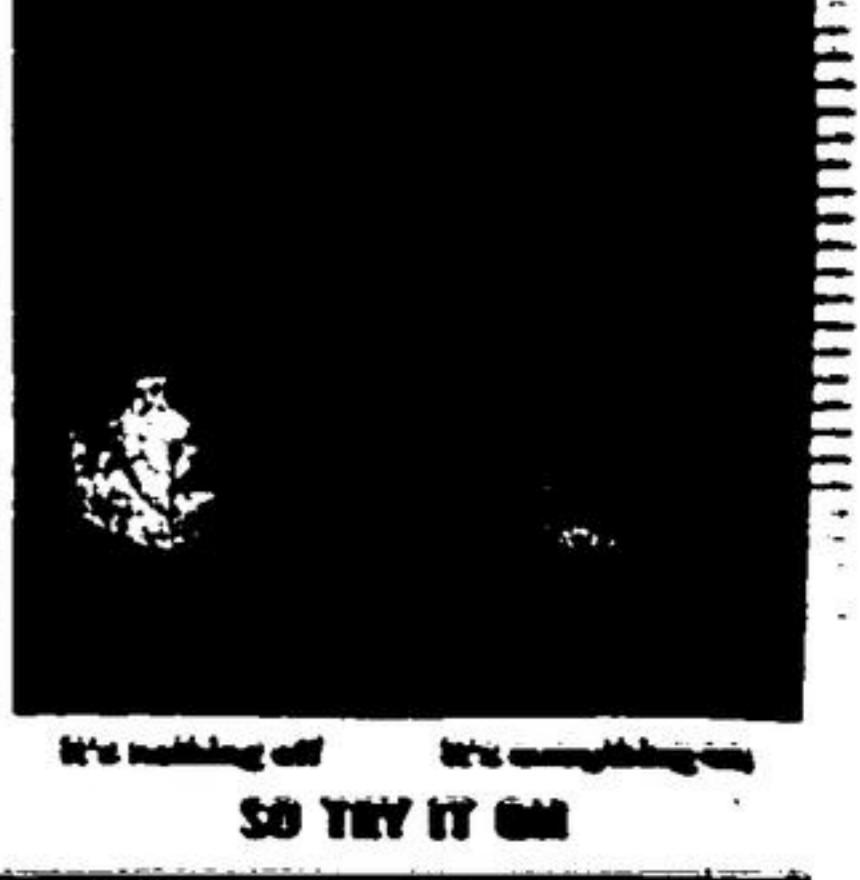
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
