### FARM NEWS

**Halton Farmer Third Pasture Competition**

Hugh Beatty, Milton, R. R. 4 placed third in the south central Ontario Pasture Competition. The competition includes the county winners in Ontario, York, Peel, Halton, Wellington and Brant Counties. Mr. Beatty was selected by J. Norman Bird, the judge of Halton's Competition to represent the county in the zone competition. The zone scoring was judged by Howard Henry, Field Crops Branch, Ontario Department of Agriculture.

Mr. Beatty was one of eleven contestants in the Halton Pasture Management Competition. The winners from each county then compete in a zone competition. The five zone winners then compete in the provincial final.

The pasture management program carried out by Hugh Beatty stresses carrying capacity and quality production. Halton is predominantly a livestock producing county and pasture production is the most important crop grown.

### BRAMPTON

One applicant for the position of fireman with the town was turned down because his hobby was sky diving, councillor Bill Brydon told council Monday night. "We considered that he wouldn't be much use to us if he was injured," he said. "Sky diving takes a lot of nerve" remarked deputy reeve Wilson. "Maybe too much" replied Cr. Brydon. Council turned thumbs down.

### BOLTON

A campaign to put artificial ice in Bolton arena has reached the halfway mark. Eight thousand dollars is the goal and the cool weather has had a direct result on the response. When temperatures dipped the donors opened their purses and the committee is now confident the quota will be reached shortly. Their slogan is "Pay now—Skate later."

### BURLINGTON

D. S. Lawless Superintendent of public Schools for Burlington, is presently involved with the Burlington Board of Education, in formulating a new guidance program to aid grade eight pupils in choosing one of the three fields of study. Eventually it is hoped grades six and seven can be integrated into the guidance system to these pupils familiar with the interest areas open to them within a few years.

### FERGUS

Beatty Brothers Limited of Fergus has obtained control of 60 percent of the stock of General Steel Ware Ltd. A letter was sent out to shareholders announcing the move last week. Beatty trade name appliances will continue to be sold under their present names and will continue to be made in Fergus but as a division of GSW.

### MILTON

Milton police this week announced a severe crackdown on underage smokers. Chief Rynders pointed out a number of thefts recently included cigarette pilfering. He stressed it was illegal for a child under 16 to smoke and it was an offense for merchants to sell to anyone under 16.

### ACTON

Acton council is trying the old post office as a solution to their over crowded municipal building. The size of the police force will be increased next year, the library is over crowded and the town office is taxed to capacity as it is. But the YMCA also have ideas about moving into the vacated P.O.

### AURORA

The first step to fill the vacancy that will be left when the O.P.'s withdraw their protection from the townships of King and Whitelock at the beginning of next year was when King council invited representatives of the four adjoining municipalities, Aurora, Newmarket, East Gwillimbury and Whitelock to discuss with them the best way to fill the vacancy. A committee has been set up to study a five municipality amalgamation.

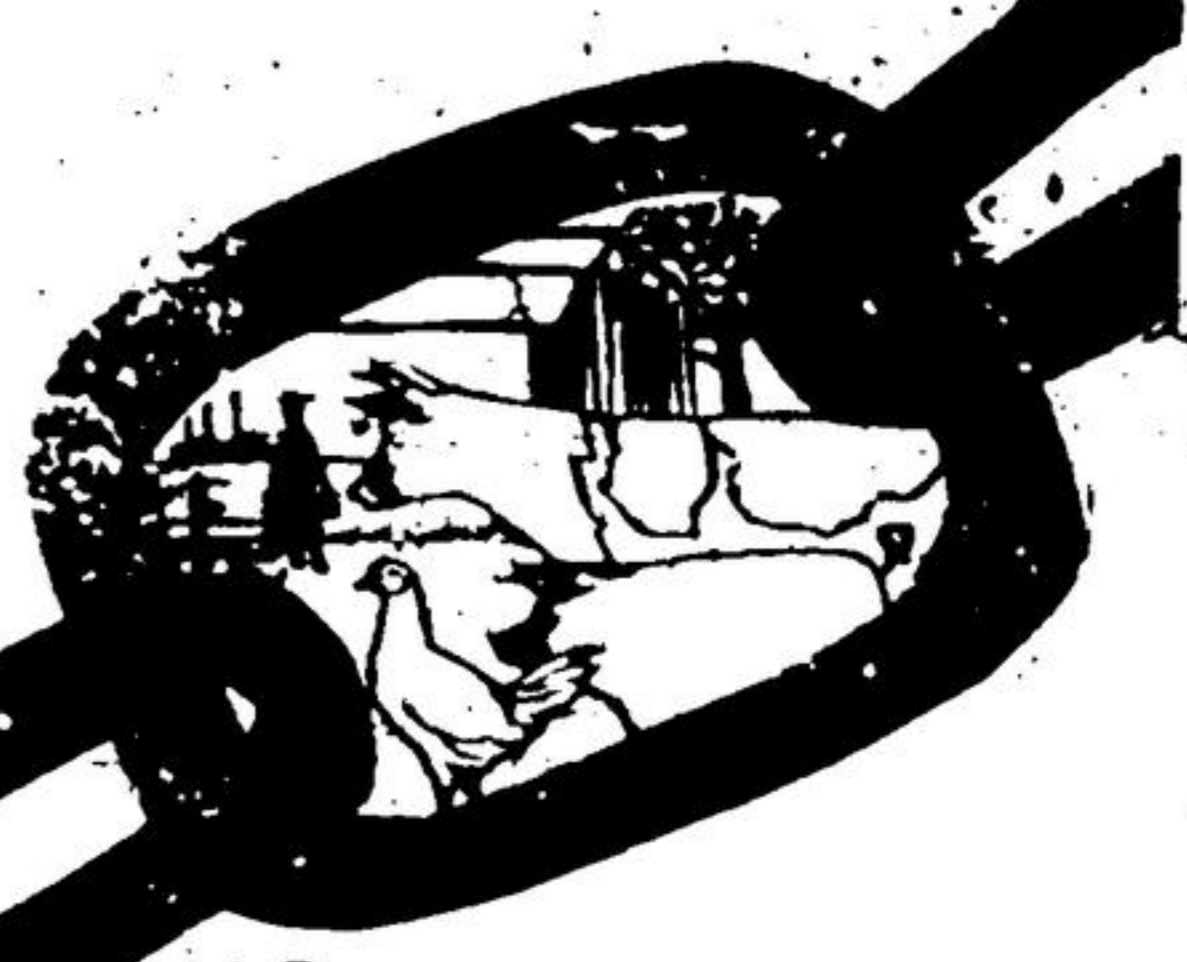
