**To Hospitals Grants Reduced In County**  
 With the third reading of the new hospital by-law at County Council last week, the new grants became effective. The County grant is now \$4,000 per bed, a reduction of \$2,000 per bed from previously. While this proposal caused much heated debate earlier in the summer, it passed without comment finally.  
 In addition the by-law provides that no grant shall be made until the number of active treatment beds in county hospitals drops below the ratio of 5.5 beds per 1,000 population.  
 Last Construction  
 On the same day a by-law to borrow \$500,000 to pay part of the grant on a 103 bed addition to Oakville-Trafalgar Memorial hospital was approved.  
 This addition squeezed in under the \$6,000 per bed grant structure. In all likelihood this will be the last hospital construction for some time in the county, since the number of beds per thousand is 6.8, including the Oakville addition, and which the \$500,000 will cover approximately two quarter payments. The debentures were sold to A. E. Ames and Co., bearing interest at 6 per cent.
