### DON'T BAG YOUR BUDDY

Georgetown Anglers & Hunters Association member Jack Mercer (left) really isn't that unorthodox in his fence crossing methods. But his obvious carelessness mirrors the complete ignorance of the rules of hunting that some so-called users-of-the-woods possess. Jack posed the scene with a couple of other local hunters, George Hoare and Don Powers, to exemplify the contrast between the right way and the way that only makes him appear more like a deer through the thick brush. George and Don have the right idea about passing the weapons over the fence, but because Jack has decided to hang onto his, it has resulted in the barrel being pointed right at his fellow hunter and another chance of a serious accident. Since 1954, 177 Ontario hunters have lost their lives because one or other hunting rule was not observed, either by themselves or another hunter. Last year most of the fatal accidents resulted because the over-anxious shooter didn't take time to identify his target as game. This year close to 100 deer hunters from Georgetown and district will be making the trek into the northland in search of the elusive whitetail, and if rules are observed the same number will come back. Play it safe.

## DISTRICT NEWS AT A GLANCE

### BRAMPTON

Brampton women have been receiving phone calls from an unidentified caller who says he represents a Toronto department store and wants to hire them as a model. Police Chief Frank Keates has advised any one receiving such a call not to follow it up. He said the company allegedly represented does not employ models by this method.

### COOKSVILLE

Efforts are being made to obtain a license for Mrs. Alice Mann and her Cooksville home for defective children, it was learned last week. Recently in the Cooksville court Mrs. Mann was fined \$25 and costs for operating a nursing home without a license under conditions described as "appalling".

### STREETSVILLE

A former Reeve, William

Arch, has levelled a salvo at Streetsville's present council, saying they have embarrassed the town and themselves by ignoring infractions of the town's zoning by-law. In a letter he stated six specific instances, one of which, he claimed, violated both municipal and provincial laws.

### CLARKSON

The Ontario Municipal Board has vetoed Toronto Township's application to provide a zoning category to permit the operation of a Fairfield Swimming Club in a Clarkson residential area. The controversial pool project has been the subject of many heated meetings for over a year. Residents regard it as the thin edge of commercial wedge.

### BURLINGTON

Burlington Mayor Owen Mullen stated five reasons why he opposed provincial control of a study of the 11 municipal paltry area of Hamilton last week. An outspoken critic of the study, Mayor Mullen stated "our past participation with the city of Hamilton has not been to the benefit of the town of Burlington".

### FERGUS

Land Games last year and came second to the Toronto Police at this year's games is currently boasting their own team of war trams and are willing to put up prizes to coax challengers. So far they have had two and won both.

### GUELPH

Guelph police commission has almost completed its program of scrapping motorbikes from the city's force. The last remaining motorcycle is expected to be discarded early next year and be replaced by an other compact car which are so popular with the commission.

### ORANGEVILLE

Saturday was a sad day for Bill Stratton and his family, owners of the well known paper, Whirlwind. The four year old race track ace, with a long string of wins to his credit, died of a heart attack while being walked around the track at Orangeville Fair Grounds. Always a high-strung and nervous, Whirlwind had been difficult to train to the noise and confusion of a race track.

### MILTON

Eight Milton boys have been charged under the Juvenile Delinquent Act for smoking under age. Police Chief Ray Adams reported the boys, who were brought before the family court last week, were remanded for various periods.

### ACTON

A daring daylight thief made his getaway with an estimated \$1,000 in cash and bearer bonds when he ransacked the home of Miss Millie Bowles of Acton, Monday morning. Police are of the opinion the thief wore white gloves, belonging to Miss Bowles.
