Ham Operators Part Of County E.M.O.

Georgetown's ham radio operators will be part of county-wide radio network being organized by the Halton County Emergency Measures Organization which will for the present have a base station at Milton, and mobile short wave radios in most of the county's municipalities.

The purpose of the network is to provide communications over and above the present telephone system. Equipment is being procured and operators will be trained at a course which will commence in the county town in the near future. There are already twenty trained and licensed radio operators in the organization, and EMO headquarters told the Herald this week that the backup will depend heavily on the ham which EMO headquarters termed "the backbone of the system" when they talked to the Herald this week. The network will be into action in emergencies such as hurricanes, floods, and in case of an attack. It will operate on a commercial frequency and some ham equipment will be utilized.

The ultimate plan will include a base station in each municipality.

Other activity is taking place in the Rescue Training and of the county EMO and the first meeting of an advanced training course was held in Milton on Tuesday, Sept. 25th. The actual training program will be on October 6th and approximately 14 men are expected to attend from Georgetown. County Co-ordinator Bruce Mac-Gregor said he was pleased with the interest shown here.

"The Georgetown group has done very well," he said. "These who have been out are Egan and one man has even become an instructor since the program was started last year."
