Wants Council Keep Garbage Contractor

An Open Letter To The Georgetown Municipal Council
10 Albert St.
Georgetown, Ont.
Sept. 30, 1962

Gentlemen,
If my memory serves me it is something over twenty-five years since Bob Lane, with one old rattletrap of a truck took on the garbage collection contract for Georgetown.
In those days, Bob was as poor as the proverbial church mouse and the contract meant a great deal to a man just recovering from a serious illness. Despite the poor equipment, the service provided was very satisfactory and a welcome addition to the needs of the town. In those days all garbage was deposited at the "Park dump" and those downwind some times had reason to wish they lived elsewhere. But despite the early problems of transport and disposal, the same contractor has fulfilled his obligations to the taxpayers in providing a very acceptable service throughout all these years, with only an odd howl from a disgruntled ratepayer (the writer included). At the same time, by his own ability, industry and integrity, he has developed a most successful business of his own, still finding time to support his church in a major construction project, spark a hockey team and do a terrific job on the many other public service groups in town.
The above is written, not to make a saint of Mr. Lane, but simply to give newer residents an insight into the type of man handling our garbage disposal. If the truth were known, I doubt if Bob has ever really made a profit on the operation, but with the garbage contract as his "bread and butter" money, he has been able to venture out into other things and at the same time, has an excellent means of keeping his otherwise part-time men, fully employed in slack seasons, and shift regular men to garbage detail in peak periods. This gives him a fluid labour pool which can meet any problem on short notice and at maximum efficiency.
If the Corporation were to take over the garbage collection there would be an immediate outlay of upwards of fifty thousand dollars for new equipment, more men to handle the equipment, more supervisory and clerical staff, as well as a never ending squabble with matters pertaining to overtime, overwork, etc., etc. As the situation now stands, old, old story, his mission is out of our population of over ten thousand, there are perhaps fifty people who have had something to complain about as to the handling of garbage. Surely it would be much better to sit down with a proven qualified contractor, as Bob Lane has proved himself to be, and iron out the relative minor problems, than to end up with thousands of tons of garbage on our laps, and no economical year in year out, regular means of disposing of it.
I suggest that you as our representatives deal with this matter sensibly, by accepting the fact that most of the townspeople are happy with our present garbage arrangements.
