COUNCIL BRIEFS

A variety of municipal business at Monday's council meeting saw:

An okay for purchase of \$250 sq. ft. of property, at a cost of \$825 to complete the Ann St. bridge, with the town responsible for 20% of the cost.

A statement by the water chairman, Wm. F. Hunter, that "no one in town is without water at present." (Recently water had been cut off to some homes where water rate payments were in arrears.)

An offer from Martin Horan to take over janitor service in the municipal building, claiming he could save the town money.

Decision to put no parking signs back on the upper part, south side of the Mill St. hill, while still allowing cars to stop opposite the post office area.

A complaint signed by six residents charging that there is a water hazard in the Lake subdivision and asking council to remedy this.
