A late stage fumble enabled an off-form Georgetown High School Rebel senior football team to steal the opening game of the 1962 schedule away from Preston in Preston Tuesday.  
Lacking much of the power that carried them to impressive triumphs in pre-season tilts, the Rebels dumped the Prestons 15-14 when John Pennock lifted a quick-kick past the dead ball line after Dave Barrager had dropped on a Preston fumble right at the 35.  
Fumbles played a big part in the contest. On the first play from scrimmage GHS bumbled into the arms of a Preston player and the home team owned a 7-0 lead after their first offensive play and the convert.  
Pennock, a standout, returned the kickoff down the sideline, but he was unable to make it 7-4 still in the early minutes of play, but the potential tying point was lost when the convert attempt failed. Preston pulled 2 points ahead later. In the 2nd quarter when a punt went for a single point. On a 60 yard march, their best of the day, McGill went over to put GHS ahead 12-7, and the convert made it 13-7. In the 4th quarter a Preston drive went from the 30 for a touchdown which was converted and the home club went in to a one point lead 14-13.

Council will seek a Private Members Bill in the Ontario legislature to provide workmen's compensation coverage for members of the Georgetown Volunteer Ambulance Service.  
Reeve John Elliott initiated action in council Monday, after telling attendants at the opening of the new ambulance quarters Saturday that he intended to do so.  
"We can save much of the \$800 we are now paying in insurance coverage" the reeve pointed out. "And this is the fastest way of getting action, which we have talked about for some time."  
"Long overdue" Cr. Jim Emmerman termed the motion, pointing out the GVAS members run risk of back injuries in their work, as well as of accident while answering calls.

**Emblem Breakfast for Local Businesswomen**

All over the free world Business and Professional Women will be celebrating Business Women's Week from October 14th to October 20th. The local club is joining with the Newmarket club for an Emblem Breakfast and will have a window display in the Herald Office window as well as concentrating on the work of the aims and objectives as revised at the National Conference in St. Andrew's. The aims and objectives were revised at this conference due to world-wide changes not only in the status of women but in the methods and techniques of business and industry since the International Federation was formed in 1930.  
The revised version reads:  
(1) To organize business and professional women for the use of their combined abilities and strength in all parts of the world for the attainment of the following aims and objectives:  
(a) To work for high standards of service in business and industry and to ensure the continuation of these high standards of service by the development, training, encouragement and participation of girls and young women in the activities of the organization in all countries.  
(b) To provide information and assistance to achieve equal status for women in economic, civic and political life in all countries.  
(c) To provide programs and to encourage women and girls —  
(a) To acquire occupational training and advanced education;  
(b) To use their occupational capacities and intelligence for the advantage of others as well as themselves.  
(4) To promote friendly relations and understanding among the business and professional women of all countries.  
(5) To stimulate the interest of and encourage the participation of trained women with the specialized knowledge and the technical skill of business and professional women in the business of government in community, national and world governmental organizations.  
2. To collect and present the views of business and professional women to world organizations and agencies.  
The national president, Miss Eileen Gregory MacGill, states in her message  
If scientists were to send a signal today from Earth to the star Arcturus, it would be 65 years before we would receive the return signal.
