Board Answer Slow Re Land Release Query

But Council Will Wait For Advice

Slowness of the Dept. of Municipal Affairs in submitting an opinion on a land release agreement with Delrex Developments, Ltd., which Georgetown council has approved, was criticized Monday.

A letter from Harold Barstow, general manager of Delrex Developments pointed out that the firm had been advised on August 21st that council was willing to draw up a new agreement and his company on Sept. 4th indicated its acceptance and forwarded the agreement for execution.

The letter asked council to take immediate steps to implement the intent of council's resolution.

The agreement, which passed only town in trouble and I guess they have more than one town council by a 7-2 vote decided to ask senior advice before proceeding further. The new agreement would release more residential building land presently tied up by unfilled terms of a 1954 ratio agreement.

Cr. Fred Harrison was for giving the department another week to reply and if nothing is forthcoming revert back to doing business ourselves.

"It's very foolish to ask an opinion and then change our mind," said Reeve Elliott who was promoter of getting department advice.

"I'm amazed at the reeve's audacity in proposing that we should still hold off," said Cr. Bob McNeilly. "He led us down the garden path originally by claiming a special municipal department committee looks after matters like this. After some digging I have discovered that no committee of this type has ever been laid out."

Cr. McNeilly wondered what position council would be in to make an offer and back down on a business transaction.

Have Experts

Reeve Elliott denied stating there is a special committee, although one of the newspapers had reported this.

"However, the department does have experts dealing with such matters," he said.

"Either the reeve is lying or I was hearing things," said Cr. McNeilly, asking the mayor for confirmation.

Mayor Sargent said he recalled someone talking about such a committee but could not say who.

"I can understand the impatience of councillors at the delay in answering but I am reluctant to take further action until we have some word from the department," he said.

Cr. Harrison opined that when an answer had been promised in two weeks and almost five weeks elapsed, he would assume there is nothing wrong with the proposed agreement.

Thomas Slater Kayoed In Fume Filled Pipe

Thomas Slater is in hospital today in fair condition, after being knocked unconscious by gas poisoning.

A member of the town's work staff, Slater was working in a man hole Monday evening when the potent gas overcame him. He was worked over by Dr. C. V. Williams and rushed to hospital where he remained unconscious for three hours. Thursday he was unable to raise his head but the report from hospital today was that his condition was very much improved.

Locating Pipe

Hank Westerveld, a co-worker told the Herald that Slater, another man, Ivan Kaminsky and himself were locating a storm sewer pipe at the north side of John St. West, when the accident happened. He said he had been in the man hole in the morning and had come up more than once when his head started to swim. The job of the man in the manhole was to tap on the inside of the pipe while the other two, using a hearing device, sought its location from the side of a bank.

Westerveld said Slater had just taken over the tapping job. The locater picked up a couple of knucks and then nothing. Slater Slater told him that he started to come up when he felt woozy, but didn't have the strength to get buy and the first rung of the ladder. When the tapping failed to resume Westerveld and Kaminsky rushed to the manhole and found their workmate crumpled at the bottom.

Get Help

Westerveld descended and tied a rope around him, but the pair were unable to raise him by themselves. With assistance from Gord Harley and Ken Hill of nearby Harley Motors, they got him to ground level where he momentarily regained consciousness and tried to get up. The men restrained him until the doctor arrived. The GVA5 took him to Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital.

According to Westerveld, Slater was wearing a gas mask when he descended into the manhole and still had it on when he was found.

Because it was a storm sewer it is improbable that the gas he inhaled was sewer gas, but could have been carbon monoxide. In either case had Slater not been rescued immediately he would never have recovered.

YMCA Financial Campaign Is Getting Good Response

\$2,000 Already Donated In Canvass

First dispatches from the YMCA-YWCA Campaign Headquarters on Main St. indicate that there will in all likelihood be a Y program operating here this winter.

Eric Eamon, the executive director of the Brampton Y, who will serve here part time in the same capacity, said Tuesday that the 400 subscription cards returned to that date had pledged, \$1,939, one fifth of the target amount of \$10,000. There are approximately 3,000 pledge cards out, 2,000 as part of the general canvass and the rest are held by commercial businesses and industry.

The committee is using the 12 polling subdivisions as their canvass divisions and each division has a section leader, Harold Catling, Graham Farredd and Mrs. Max English. Rev. Lloyd Whan is in charge of the general door to door canvass, and the other departments are headed by: Don Powers, in Town Industrial; Doug Latimer, in Town Commercial; and Claude Kentner, Out of Town Industrial and Commercial. The Campaign Committee chairman is Jack Armstrong.

APPROACHING FIRST 100 HOURS

AVIAN AIRCRAFT'S THIRD prototype of the 2-180 has almost completed a big step towards certification. Its first one hundred hours in the air. A company spokesman told the Herald this week that the 100 hours mark will be passed any time now and although the firm could apply for a type of certification at the 150 hour mark it will probably not make application until the third bird has been airborne for over 500 hours. The engine powering Georgetown's unique aircraft has performed for 1,250 hours. And while the gold coloured third prototype chugs towards approval by the board of transport, the company is readying to start lethered checks of the 4th gyroplane, which is expected to roll out of the plant's hangar door at the end of the month.

Safety Measures are Planned for Ewing

Action for easing pedestrian traffic on Ewing St. was forecast Monday when Council took initial action to have a survey made of the street which has drainage problems and a bad highway approach.

At the highway white lines will mark pedestrian walks and cost estimates are being obtained on moving a telephone pole and hydrant.
