Special Services Is New Brampton Post

To keep pace with the continuing growth in the Brampton Local Office area the National Employment Service has appointed Mr. George Egan as full time Special Services Officer to their Brampton Local Office. The duties of the Special Services Officer are to assist:

1. Young people looking for their first job and who need to be interviewed and counseled very carefully in relation to their training and experience and may need further training to fit them for some specialized work.

2. Those people who by reason of some physical, mental or moral handicap find it difficult to find work of their own.

3. The older person who needs work and requires the assistance of the special services officer to overcome some of the prejudice against hiring the older worker, and to assist in their search to locate suitable work for them.

4. Those with personal problems who need a special person they can talk to and to assist them in finding suitable work.

All of these people must be interviewed carefully in order to best assist them. There are many other phases of the work. One important one is taking care of the needs of veterans; another is co-operating with public and high schools and to develop a working agreement with the guidance of officers to assist in the placement of difficult cases.

Another duty of the special services officer is to address interested organizations to advise them of the work the special services officer undertakes and seeking their co-operation and assistance in placing difficult cases.

Mr. Egan originally joined the National Employment Service in Brampton in 1951 as a Clerk. He was promoted first to the Long Branch Local Office then to Wallaceburg as Supervisor of Employment. He was then transferred from Wallaceburg to Coburg as Supervisor of Employment. After gaining experience in general employment in these offices he was promoted to Special Services Officer and served in various Toronto offices prior to his present position.

Mr. Egan was born in Toronto and moved to Brampton with his parents in 1950. His family has lived in Brampton since that time. He was married in Brampton in 1961 and he and his wife are establishing their home there.

She said that ten of the fourteen players who attended the first meeting came from Georgetown. The club plans to meet every Monday.

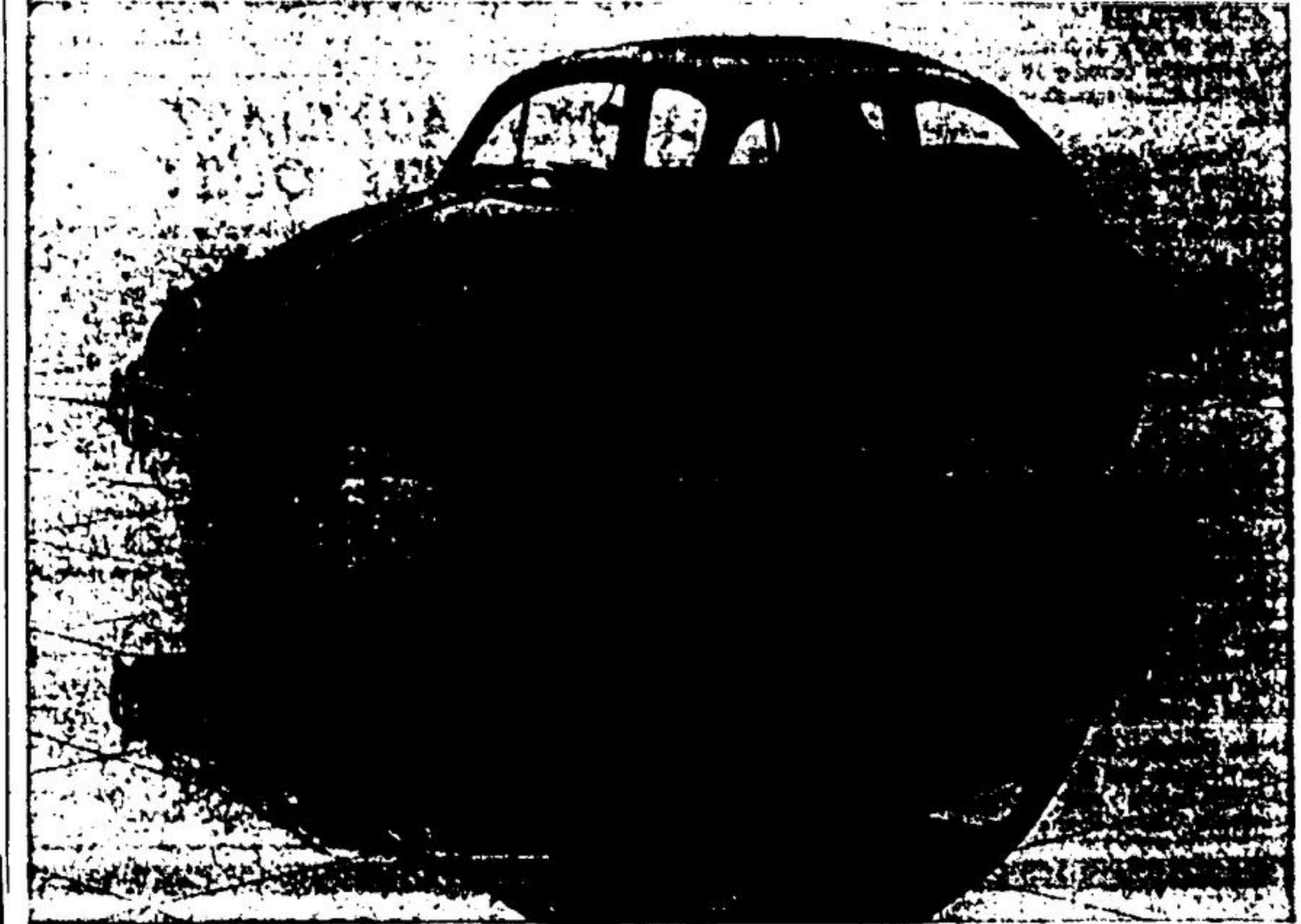
