African Women Need Homemaking Training

Miss Audrey McKim from Toronto was guest speaker to ladies of St. Andrew's United Church Women at their autumn thanksgiving meeting at the church on the evening of October 10th.

Assisted by Mrs. A. Mathias, Mrs. H. Allan and Mrs. A. Holder, Mrs. N. Wadhams conducted the service and introduced Miss McKim. The two ladies are personal friends.

Business World
Miss McKim, after being in the business world, completed her teacher's matriculation at Ontario Ladies College, Whitby, then attended the United Church Training school and took her B.A. degree at University of Toronto. She served as a stenographer at Kingston and Kelowna United churches before becoming editor for Sunday School publications at the United Church head office.

Last summer she was a volunteer in the Crossroads Africa project and the many experiences during her Kenya stay were vividly related. As a woman, speaking to women, she stressed the vital need for educating African women who are treated as beasts of burden by teaching proper diet and simple housemaking as well as that eventually illness caused by unbalanced diet and malnutrition can be eliminated. The native African economy could be raised by teaching how to grow cash crops and make handicrafts for marketing.

Manual Education
She is so convinced of the existing need that she is returning to Kenya after a year to help form a centre for women where needed education will be provided.

Mrs. K. Johnston thanked Miss McKim for her message and assured her that wherever she went the prayers of the St. Andrew's ladies would be with her.
