HARD LUCK FOOTBALL REBELS REALLY MET THEIR WATERLOO

Failure to take advantage of scoring opportunities has cost the GHS Rebels their unbeaten record and possibly the league title.

On a waterlogged field in Waterloo Tuesday the Rebels pushed their bigger opponents around with surprising ease in the first half but piled up a meagre 13-7 lead and it was this inability to capitalize on their play domination that enabled Waterloo-Oxford to bounce back and snatch away a 15-14 triumph in one of the real tough ones of the 1942 football season.

An indication of Georgetown's offensive superiority in the first half is in the first downs statistics where GHS owned a commanding 16 to 1 advantage. And yet, with but a single first down to their credit, W-O walked off for the half time breather with a touchdown and trailing by just 6 points when it could have been 24 points.

In fact Waterloo-Oxford owned a single off that miscue to go ahead early scoring edge, ahead 14-13. Another McGill Georgetown opened with a single point and appeared to have the W-O offense in a bottle. But like a ball from the blue, a play that the Rebels had been defending in their practice sessions all week, caught the secondary back on their heels and went 90 yards for the Waterloo major score.

Missed Converts In the second quarter GHS Rebels shifted into a T formation and harried the Waterloo corner backers with quick pitches that went for good yardage. A big gainer was John Pennock's burst from the 25 into the 12 which set up Georgetown's first touchdown. A dive play left and then a pitch out to Hepper on the right side capped the drive and put GHS in front 7-6. The convert was tipped at the line and missed the uprights.

In the same quarter Sparky McGill hit Denny Martel with a pass in the right flat and he went from the 18 to the four before getting the bounce in touch. Bob Wrigglesworth carried off tackle on the next play from scrimmage and made it to pay dirt. For the second time the convert attempt failed.

In the third quarter, Georgetown's offensive platoon had their hands on the ball exactly twice, as Waterloo made adjustments, patched up their porous defensive line and then wrestled command away from their haughty visitors. Part of the switch in ball control was due to Rebel mistakes however.

Reverse Scores A great goal line stand was spoiled when Waterloo-Oxford fooled everybody with a reverse on their last shot. The outside defensive backs were cut down like so many corn stalks and the ball carrier had a clear path into the end zone. That tied it 13-13.

Estimate \$3000 Repair Bills from Accidents

In a week motorists have, through a rash of collisions, had their cars smashed to the extent of an estimated \$3,000 damage here.

Monday night, during the downpour, a 1962 Chev driven by Helen Caroline Abell of Ottawa and a '62 Ford driven by Douglas K. Pantling of 74 Weber Dr. suffered an estimated \$400 damage when the Abell car struck the side of the Pantling car while he was making a left turn off Guelph St. onto Sinclair.
Mrs. Abell suffered back injuries and was treated by Dr. Macintosh before being taken to Georgetown Hospital.

Prior to the weekend, a car coming around the south side of the Delrex plaza stores glanced off a parked vehicle opposite Delrex Restaurant and ploughed through the restaurant plate glass, luckily hitting no one. The driver, Malcolm Louis Weller of 91 Floridale, Conksville, told police his foot slipped off the brake and hit the gas as he negotiated the turn.

The parked car, owned by Ivan Padlugar, of 11 Langstone Cres., took \$75 damage, the smashed window and frame, \$500, and the 1962 Pontiac driven by Weller, \$350.

Three cars were damaged when brakes failed at the intersection of Guelph St. and Mountview Road Sunday. The first car, a 1961 Studebaker Lark driven by Elizabeth Wynne of Rexdale had stopped waiting for east-bound traffic to clear before making a left turn off Guelph onto Mountview. Nicholas Vreken, driving a 1957 Chev convertible, pulled up behind and stopped, and a third car, a 1965 Olds driven by John Guyett of 6 Gibbons Place was coming to a halt when the rakes failed. In the chain-reaction collision damaged was estimated at close to \$1,400. The Vreken car took the brunt of the damage, \$800 worth. The accident occurred at about 3 p.m.

Chief Roy Haley said Tuesday the school board would have to go to great expense to have the wall sand-blasted.

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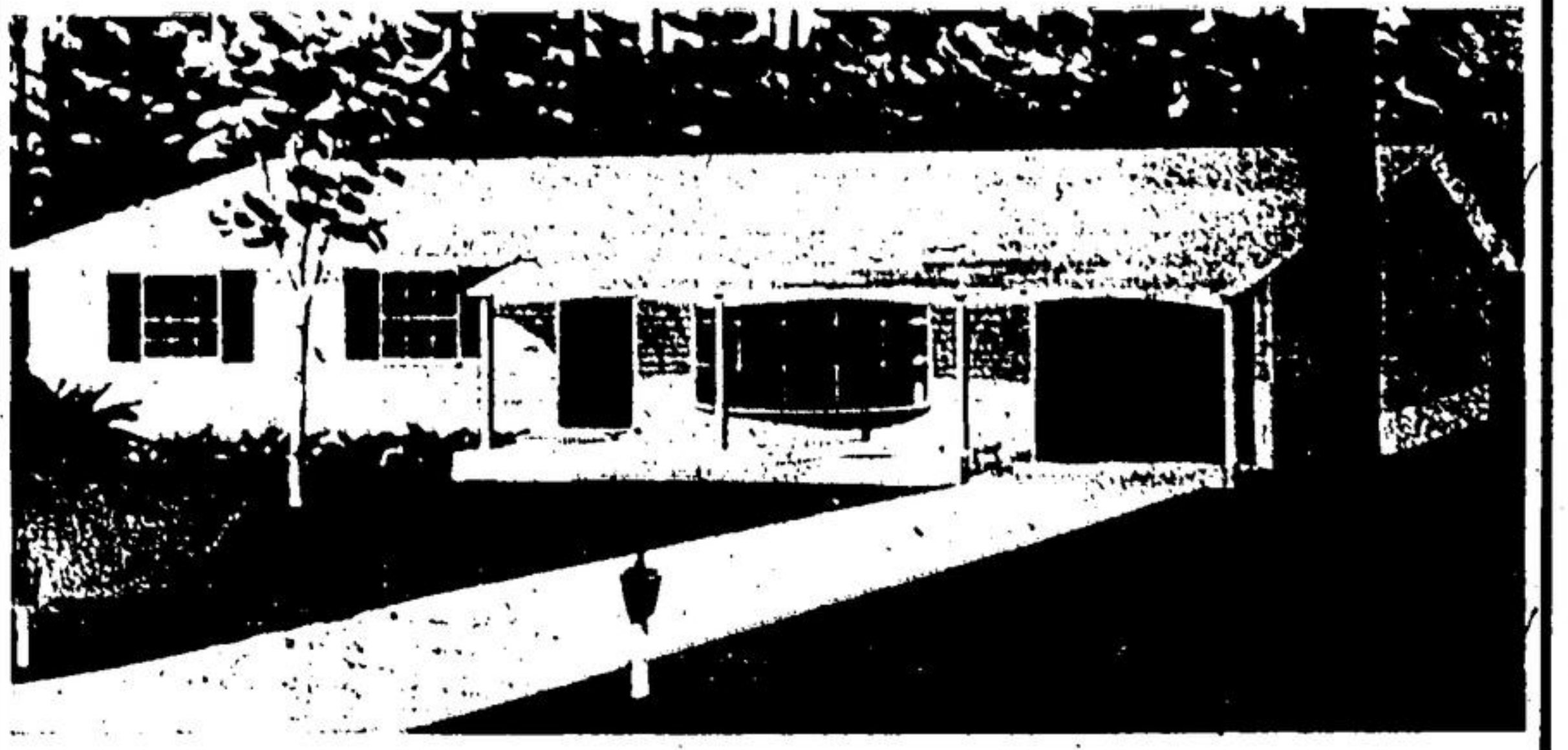
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
