Georgetown's first advance poll for municipal elections has been set for Saturday, December 1st.

"No Need" So Drop Rent Subsidy Plan

Georgetown has no need for low rental subsidized housing, according to a survey recently completed by a government agency.

The housing plan is available to communities where proof is found that enough families reside who cannot meet rental costs. Only ten completed questionnaires were received locally in a survey and the answers received do not justify continuing with any local plan, council was informed Monday.

However, the government is willing to study further the possibility of low rental accommodation for elderly pensioners, the letter said.
