The Legion's Saturday morning Hockey for boys swings into action again this Saturday morning. It's bigger, better and earlier in the morning than ever!

BOWLERS — SAVE WEAR AND TEAR ON TEMPER

In bowling, being a sport in which there are so many more people participating all at the same time, you have to have certain rules to govern good behaviour on the lanes. Although these rules may vary from place to place, the basic ones are similar everywhere because they are just a matter of common sense and courtesy.

Here are some of the more familiar ones from across the country.

- Stay back of the foul line at all times including open bowling.
- Do not disturb or distract the bowler on the adjoining lane by delivering your ball at the same time. The bowler on the right has the right-of-way.
- You should not pass in front of another bowler to pick your ball from the rack.
- Watch for your turn to bowl and be ready so as not to cause unnecessary delay.
- When the match is over leave the playing area immediately so that the next league may start.
- Practice shots should be very limited so your team may get started on time.
- Pins on the channels should be cleared away before the ball is delivered.
- Chalk of powder should not be used on your shoes. It cracks the leather and leaves the approaches in poor condition for the bowler who follows you. Also check your shoes to see there is nothing on them to mar the approach.
- Do not touch, speak or heckle a bowler when he is addressing the pins.
- Respect the equipment, getting the ball out of the lane, is good bowling, but "lofting" the ball hursrs your game and damages the lane bed.
- Be a good sport. Encourage others and grin at your own hard luck.
