To the crisp sharp sound of munching, a motion was passed to sell closed schools at Limehouse and Blue Mountain by public tender. Trustee Mac Sprowl objected, feeling that consideration should be given to organizations which approached the board earlier in the year.

## Six Already in Georgetown Election Field

At least six ratepayers have publicly announced their intentions of running for office in Georgetown's December municipal elections. This week Walter Gray, a former deputy reeve, appeared at council on Tuesday to announce he would be a council candidate in Ward 1. And two other men informed the Herald they would run. Leonard Burns in Ward 2 and W. R. "Burr" Smith in Ward 3.

## DMO Officials Visit Georgetown Today

What was termed a 'fact finding visitation' by town clerk C. G. Benham will be in Georgetown today (Thursday). In connection with council's request that the Dept. of Municipal Affairs study a new agreement which a council majority has approved with Delrex Developments, Ltd. Mr. Benham said Mr. Boulton of that Department had phoned him that day. And the clerk suggested that solicitor George C. Hawson, works superintendent Geoffrey Bligh, public and high school board secretaries James F. Evans and Ernest Forgrave, assessment commissioner Cliff Hibbert and auditor Walter Pope should be on hand to supply information which the Department might require.

## New Police Cruiser To Replace No. 2

Georgetown will have a new police cruiser within the next few weeks. Tuesday, council endorsed purchase of a 1963 Chevrolet from Scott Motors. It will replace the No. 2 cruiser which was scrapped after a highway accident recently.

The purchase followed a police committee meeting at which it was decided to invite bids from four local dealers.

Deputy Reeve Hunter told Council that repair of the damaged cruiser was estimated at \$1,000 and that the insurance firm had offered a \$1400 settlement. Council agreed that it would be good business to apply this sum to purchase of a new vehicle rather than repair a car which has travelled some 85,000 miles.

A seven year old Norval girl was knocked from her bike as she started home from school Tuesday.

Pauline Lawrence, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. Lawrence, was treated at her home by Dr. Douglas of Brashton for bruises and shock after being struck by a westbound car driven by Ross Marton of Acton on his way from work.

A passenger in the Marton car said the youngster just rode into the path of the car and apparently did not notice it. One of her shoes was found about fifty feet from the point of impact.

The bike was smashed and the car received about \$10 damage. Cst. Carman Wright of the North Halton Detachment OPP was dispatched to the scene at about 4:02 p.m. and made the investigation.

## New Legion Chaplain Will Conduct Service

Mr. Johnston, who is minister of St. Andrew's United Church will be joined by Rev. Bruce Woods of Maple Ave. Baptist who will give an address and Rev. Ronald Stubby of St. Alban's, Glen Williams and St. Paul's Anglican, Norval, memorial prayers.

Mayor Doug Sargent will start the service with opening remarks and the pipe club of Legion Branch 120 will sing while wreaths are being placed.

The names of 26 who were killed in World War I; 37 in World War II and two in Korea will be called in the honour roll.

## Reflects Esquimes Financing Good

The almost immediate sale of \$70,000 debentures for the new Esquimes township building at 100 55, or slightly above par, reflects the high regard the financial world has for the soundness of the Esquimes economy.

The debentures were sold by tender to J. L. Graham and Co., the best of seven bidders, at the Esquimes Township council meeting Monday night. Interest rate is 5 1/4%.

## Bury Lines

An experiment in burying telephone lines on the shoulder of rural roads will be tried in Esquimes township within the next two weeks.

Bell Telephone representatives obtained approval from Esquimes Council on Monday night for a 'trial run' on the 9th line and two sections of the 6th line.

Jim Paul, right of ways area supervisor, outlined some of the benefits of buried cable. Among them were appearance, avoidance of storm damage and the preservation of trees.

## HIBBERT IS NEW ASSESSOR

While Mr. Hibbert's appointment was not opposed on qualifications, two councilmen voted against it. Cr. Harrison felt the position should be advertised. And Cr. McNeilly said Mr. Hibbert should first be asked if he would accept the post at the \$500 salary reduction offered from the previous figure.
