**OPP INSPECT COPTER WRECKAGE**

THE BELL HELICOPTER in which three men narrowly missed serious injury when it crashed near Acton is inspected by Corporal Kingman of the North Halton detachment of the OPP. The helicopter cost \$51,000 new and is a total writeoff.

**Propose Highway Bypass at Brampton**

A four-lane bypass for Highway 10 cutting through Brampton along the Etobicoke Creek and the diversion channel was proposed by the Department of Highways, Monday night. Starting just north of the Brampton Mill, the bypass would follow the Etobicoke through the town and rejoin Highway 10 north of the Highway 7 junction. Mayor Carman Core explained the department had abandoned plans for a bypass which would swing one or two concessions east or west. "It feels that you will not get people using a bypass where they have to swing two miles out and two miles back just to miss a town," said the mayor. He said the department wanted Council reaction.

"Land along the Etobicoke we could beautify," exclaimed Councillor Lias Trout. "I always thought this was going to be parkland. Now they're going to put a highway there." "If they are planning this on the basis of that one-day survey in Brampton they'd better have another look," commented Councillor Bill Brydon. "If it doesn't go outside the town it's just adding to our traffic problems."

"I suppose the people are highway engineers now," said Councillor Brydon. "Not any more than we are," retorted the mayor. Mr. Brydon said Council should find out what portion it is going to have to pay. "It's not going to cost us a cent," stated the mayor.

"You mean they are going to build a four-lane highway right through the town for nothing?" asked Councillor C. M. Corkeil. "Yes," said the mayor.

**Auto Industry Will Benefit, Says Harley**

Ottawa: (Special to the Herald) — Recently announced changes in government policy with respect to the importation of automatic transmissions and car engines were described as a real challenge to the Canadian industry, by Dr. Harry Harley, Liberal MP for Halton. Commenting on an announcement by Finance Minister Gao, Mulvan that the 25 per cent tariff on such imports from the USA would be rebated if the Canadian industry can increase its own auto and parts exports, Dr. Harley said he felt the move was a good thing. He said it went part of the way toward implementing some of the recommendations contained in Professor Bladen's royal commission report on the industry.

"The government's action still gives the industry the opportunity to benefit from the free entry of such auto components if it can boost its own exports," the Halton MP noted. "If the industry cannot do this, it will mean of course somewhat higher prices for Canadian cars." But he expressed the hope that the industry could meet the challenge posed by the government and in so doing, keep the price of cars down and, at the same time help Canada's balance of payments position with respect to the importation of cars and parts from

Premier John Roberts is coming to Georgetown district on Thursday November 15th. The Prime Minister of Ontario is to be the guest speaker at the annual Progressive Conservative dinner meeting to be held at the Riviera, Normal on that date. Mr. Roberts has held the office of Prime Minister last held by Hon. Leslie Frost, since last October when he was elected a convention in Toronto. He is a lawyer, a native of London, Ontario, and served with the Royal Canadian Navy as a lieutenant commander during World War II. He was mentioned in dispatches for gallantry during his service overseas. This is the first official visit of Premier Roberts to the North Halton district, although a few weeks ago he opened Milton Trade Fair and recently held a meeting with county PC executive members in Burlington.

This promises to be an outstanding evening for Halton Conservatives, and the dinner starts at 7:30, followed by dancing. It is expected that a large crowd will be present to hear the prime minister.

**DISTRICT NEWS AT A GLANCE**

**STREETSVILLE**  
A break in at the A & P Supermarket in Streetsville last week netted thieves 347 cartons of cigarettes, valued at approximately \$1,000. The break in was made through a steel door.

**BRAMPTON**  
The design of the proposed city hall was accepted in principle by Bramp- ton Council on Monday night and a by-law is being prepared to ask voters to spend \$575,000. Council approved a property committee recommendation to draft the money by-law, which if approved by voters, will borrow the sum on a twenty year basis.

**BURLINGTON**  
An opinion at Monday's finance committee meeting that Burlington was not getting as much out of county council as they are putting into it prompted members of the committee to discuss possible withdrawal from county politics. Burlington wants more than the present number of reps on the council, but Oakville, with the same allotment feels the setup is sufficient.

**ORANGEVILLE**  
A jury, after deliberating for twenty-five minutes, recommended that seat belts be made mandatory on all vehicles following testimony in an Orangeville inquest last Tuesday. The inquest probed the death of Edward Isaac Blackburn, 84, of New Toronto who was killed in a car accident.

**CALEDON**  
Last Wednesday a stop-work order was placed by the Supreme Court on construction of a factory at Caledon. The order was for one week. In the meantime, Caledon Steel Enterprises is operating with most of the men and machinery out of doors.

**GUELPH**  
While Firefly, the latest U.S. space satellite burrs through outer space hundreds of electronic eyes are being tuned to track its progress. And in Guelph Valeriot Electronics Ltd. has been added to the list of official tracking stations keeping watch over the 335 pound orb as it travels more than 700 miles above the earth.
