**Seek Blood Donors for November 29th Clinic**

The second Red Cross Blood Donor Clinic will be held in Georgetown on Nov. 29th at Knox Church Hall and again the Georgetown and District Branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society is asking public minded citizens to help maintain a credit balance in the blood bank available to all Georgetowners and citizens in the district in the near by hospital.

The very encouraging response to the 1961 clinic being contacted by telephone leads one to believe that perhaps the 439 donors recorded can be maintained or beaten this year. All those who donated at the last clinic are being contacted by telephone by a volunteer telephone committee and for those who do not have telephones or could not donate at the last clinic, registration cards are available at the above mentioned clinic.

A donation of blood takes only half an hour, it costs nothing — but there is not enough money in the world to buy this life-giver. Each year, nearly half a million bottles of blood are collected and distributed by the Canadian Red Cross Blood Transfusion Service. This blood, donated by voluntary donors, is provided FREE OF CHARGE to patients in hospitals participating in the service across Canada.

The Blood Donor Clinic will be held at Knox Church Hall from 2 to 4:30 and 8 to 8:45 p.m. Refreshments are served before and after donating and a volunteer transportation committee will provide transportation for any donors requiring it. For mothers of small children, a baby-sitting service will be available on request.

Thursday, November 29th, is Red Cross Blood Donor Day in Georgetown and half an hour spent at the Blood Donor Clinic will be the safest and cheapest premium anyone can pay for a human life. Who knows? It may be your child's, your friend's, or even your own life you are ensuring.

"Given Own Blood, Yours, France (UPI) — Elie Erhard, 42, a farmer at Chibouctou, donated blood to a local blood bank. A few hours later his arm was mangled by a harvesting machine he was repairing. He was given a transfusion of the blood he had donated."
