### Convention of OMHA Attended By Local Men

On Saturday, November 3rd in the King Edward Hotel, the Ontario Minor Hockey Association held its 29th Annual Meeting. Members in attendance representing Georgetown interests were Bill Richmond, York-County representative, Bill James, Midget club, C. Norton, Hamilton club and G. Dixon and E. Jackson of the Free Wee club.

1. Referees for final and semi-final games will be appointed by O.M.H.A.
2. All play-off games shall be refereed by only approved O.M.H.A. officials (an O.H.A. referee card is not an approved official).
3. All players in Midget and lower series with exception of the goal keeper shall wear helmets. Use of full face goal keeper shall be optional. Referee is not to start play if any player is on the ice without a helmet. Play is not to be stopped due to a helmet coming off during a play. Violation of this rule shall be grounds for a protest.
4. No person shall be eligible for nomination to the Executive of the O.M.H.A. if he is connected in any way with a professional hockey organization.

#### Some Officers

The same Executive of last year were returned to their offices with the addition of J. Roxborough Jr. as an executive member. After ending the 1960-61 year with a deficit of \$531.15, the treasurer reports for 1961-62 showed a net profit of \$300.88 for all O.M.H.A. teams. Net expenditures of the year were \$14,594.19.

1961-62 for Minor Hockey in Ontario was a record year. There were 629 teams in group one by playdowns, totalling 12,300 players as compared to 11,810 players and 592 teams in 1960-61. Players taking part in local league minor hockey across the province totalled 29,160, accounting for 1,958 teams as compared to 34,800 and 1,744 teams in 1960-61.

#### Boy Before Game

Bill Richmond, Georgetown's Tri-County rep., said after the meeting "The greatness of an organization is not necessarily reflected by the number of teams or players, nor by the financial status. An organization can be successful even if it goes in the red or only breaks even. It needs to provide proper leadership and I don't mean leadership just to create professional hockey (players) but leadership to encourage the young lads and set them to grow into useful citizens, citizens of the adult world, educated and having a sense of fair play and loyalty to their country." So to all 206 managers, coaches and executive of all leagues and groups, please put the welfare of the boy before the game.
