Says Town Need is Permanent Pavements

Dear Sir,
A week or two ago, a group of people founded an association aiming to improve conditions in Georgetown's Ward 3. They held a dance.

May I make a more constructive suggestion: Let us work for the completion of the paving of our roads, for example, as it stands now, the surface treatment of most streets in the subdivision is barely sufficient to allow traffic to pass; some roads are in a far worse condition.

What is needed is a permanent asphalt pavement with proper curbs installed. At the same time, sidewalks have to be repaired where they have deteriorated and the catch basins of the storm water system have to be aligned with the pavement.

Admittedly, this is an ambitious undertaking which we may not be able to complete all at once. But because the programme is of some magnitude, it should be started immediately after the new council takes office in January. One of the new council's first tasks must be the drafting of a plan, ensuring the completion of the road paving programme within a reasonable time. As all public expenditures, the cost should come out of revenue collected by general taxation without the levying of additional taxes. And under no circumstances must the opening of additional residential sections with even more roads to care for be permitted until this programme and others, notably the raising of the industrial assessment to a level consistent with our present population has been achieved.

Georgetown's Ward 3, the "Delrex" subdivision, is now in a state of depression with the housing market at a standstill. The adoption of a road programme as outlined above will do much to improve this situation.

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Georgetown Stores Plan Evenings Open

Georgetown Businessmen's Association asked council on Tuesday to set Christmas shopping hours by law. The group would have stores drop their Monday closing in December and allow evening opening until 9:00 p.m. commencing Dec 12th.

Council delayed an answer for a week so merchants could be contacted to see if the plan meets with majority approval. Crs. Harrison and McNeilly suggested the easiest way to deal with holiday hours would be to have the closing by law suspended for December and allow merchants to set their own hours without formal legislation. An answer was promised next Monday.
