Raiders Win Pair to Start Bright Season

A Raider hockey team that many customers doubted could get off the ground in the revitalized Central Ontario Hockey League, considering their losses, blasted into orbit on the weekend and their officials are smugly asserting the doubters that every thing is A - OK.

They lifted off with a 5-3 triumph over Dundas in front of 700 backers here Friday night, as expected. But left the league 'experts' open mouthed by bouncing the Ontario Intermediate Champions, Port Colborne, 9-6, in the canal town Sunday afternoon.

While they are patting each other on the back with one hand club execs are groping for the recommended reserves with the other. Two former Macedonians, Bob Burns, and Whitley Youngberg are trading phone conversations with Raiders, and a third Stu McNeil, late of the Detroit Red Wings, is willing to join Scotty Patterson's brigade but may not be able to on a technicality.

Car Vasey, who latched on late last season from the Galt Raiders, will bolster the defence, already strengthened by the addition of Moe Zabadiuk.

But reinforcements are not Raiders currently perched on the top rung of the COHL ladder. Granted it is a stubby lead but Raiders are sitting up there above the second place clubs, Welland, and Oakville, who have a win each, and Dundas, Port Colborne, and Fort Erie who own passages after a single start.

Added Strength

The only one of the three new talents debuting in front of the first game crowd who did not impress was Gary Luyben. The former Kitchener senior may have been lacking in conditioning but he did oozed the tenaciousness that most of the other Raiders did. He consistently trailed his linemates on rushes and twice bobbed perfect passes. Coach Scotty Patterson however, evidently feels the chunky winger can produce. He used him on his power plays.

Moe Zabadiuk and J. D. Cameron are real finds. Zabadiuk can bump, investigate a rush, and uses the grey matter as well as any rearguard when he owns the puck. If he's paired with Vasey, Raiders will have a potent duo.

Cameron won his job, and ousted Alfie Trotta with sharp goal tending in the Raiders' limited practice sessions. Under real pressure he was just as alert and handled Dundas valiantly like he had just had his nerves removed.

Blake Inglis was the first Raider to bulge the twine. He completed a play from Junior

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The teams trade goals before the period ended. Kilpatrick from Gibson and McGowan for the home club and Galt goal from Blake Inglis for Georgetown.

Surgeons counted Port Colborne's fifth goal to start the third period scaring Galt. Galt rallied midway through the frame from Wayne Thompson and Wally Magdy. And Junior Beaumont punched in his first of the season with Blake Inglis and Galt with seven minutes left. Kilpatrick boomed home his crew's 6th marker with time running out.

Rough Game

Evidence that it was a typical Niagara Peninsula type of game is contained in the statistics which saw the officials handed out 25 penalties.

Small wonder they are calling this Friday's game a return bout.

Blair Constantine from Dundas on the sheet after a minute and 56 seconds of the middle period on a shot from 15 feet out that Cameron was partly screened on. Moe Galt enabled the crowd to breathe a little easier by recapturing the two goal spread team after Dundas tallied. Luyben and Blake Graham started the attack and Galt ended by a couple of would-be defenders to trigger the shot in the short side.

In the last frame both clubs maintained their fast pace, normal for the first joust, but reflexes dulled by the six man layoff cost both sure goals in the final minute with Dundas chasing the tying goal with six attackers. Gord Thompson found himself in possession of the disc at centre ice drew a head on the taping goal and sid his shot dead centre.

Raiders bombed the Ontario champions with 4 goals in the first period, 3 in the second and two in the third in the Sunday matinee in which Moe Galt almost personally devastated the mightiest title holders with a four goal peppering.

Blake Inglis declared himself out of the slump that plagued him last season by opening the scoring with his second goal in as many games at 1:06 of the first period, fed by Gerry Inz and Moe Zabadiuk. Gord Thompson passed to Galt for number 2 at the 5:29 mark and it was two nothing but P.C. rebounded with a pair of goals in a minute and forty seconds.
