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### Urban Board Would Grow And Take Townships In

#### Think Road Equipment Could be Share Basis

Enlargement of the North Halton Urban Board, which now includes the municipalities of Acton, Milton, and Georgetown, to include the townships of Etobicoke and Mississauga was suggested at the meeting of that Board last week.

The possibility of setting up a central purchasing agency for all the municipalities was discussed. It was felt the buying in bulk of sand, gravel, road salt, etc., would provide a saving for each.

A more revolutionary idea was the rental of a fleet of trucks and graders by the combined municipalities, rather than owning any road equipment. By "renting" a whole fleet, the cost would be less, and the repairs would be included in the rental price, so some members thought.

Councillor Les Doby, of Acton, pointed out that each municipality would have to maintain work yards and have equipment on hand. "Each town wants the snow off their street first thing in the morning," he added.

Councillor J. Emmerman of Georgetown, said in his opinion each area would keep so many trucks and graders on hand all the time, just as now but in case of breakdown, the company is phoned to bring in another as a replacement.

Continuing with the theme of mutual cooperation, a proposal to help the schools for the Etobicoke on a county basis was made by urban board chairman Norman Pearce of Milton. He felt the county would handle everything, and add the cost to the county levy.

"All possible support should be taken," declared Councillor Emmerman, "perhaps we could stir up the ministerial associations in each town to back

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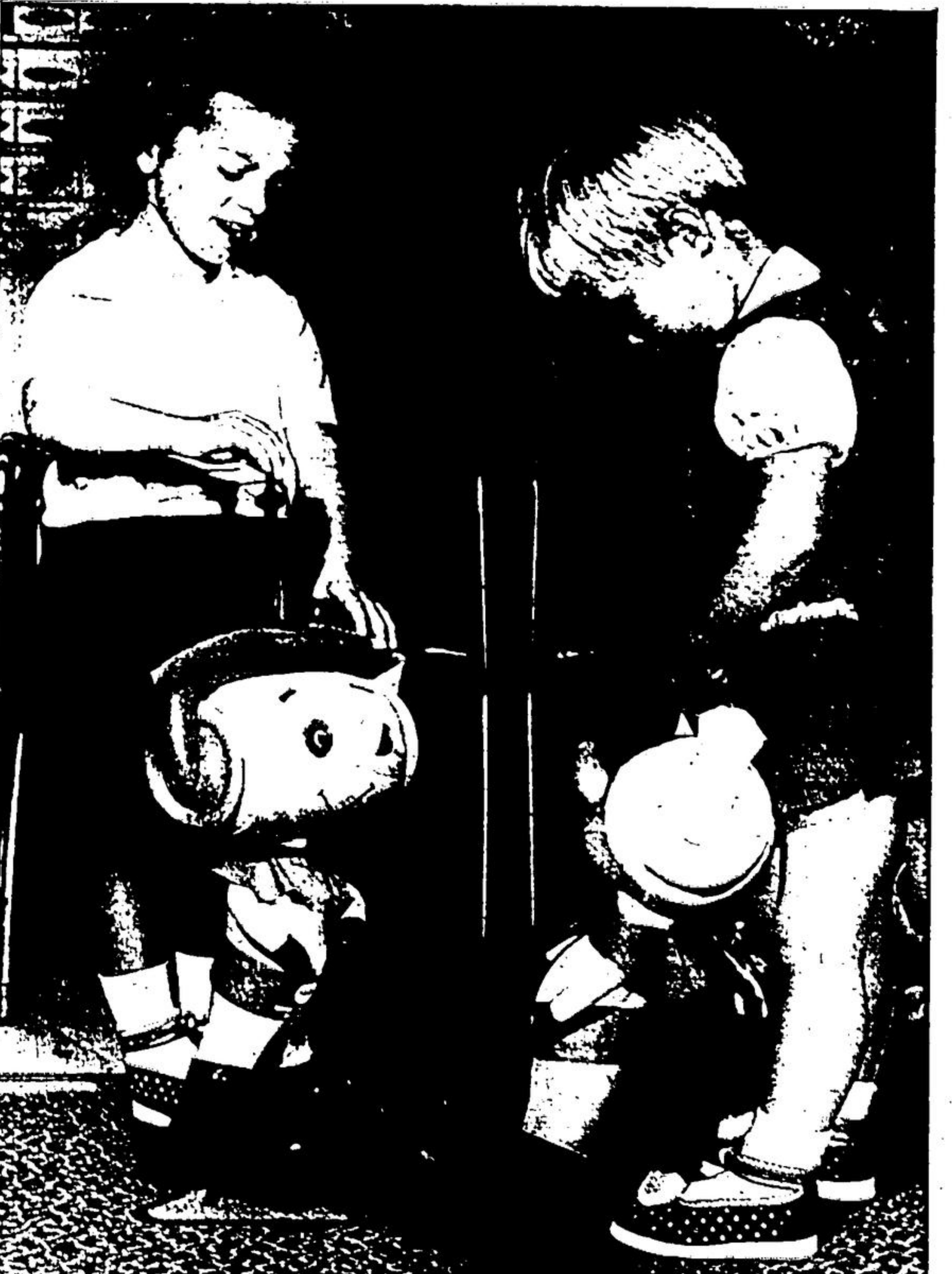
